Mrs. Hogg Reports on **Educational Project**

Tells of Work Done in White and

Colored Schools in Barnwell

County.

Under the WPA Emergency Educational Project for Barnwell County, Mrs. Margaret S. Hogg, supervisor, gives the following report of work done in the adult schools of Barnwell County, both white and colored, for the past six months:

"The division of this program consists of three agricultural schools with an enrollment of 164; one homemaking school with an enrollment of 32; one general adult school with 46 enrolled; five literary schools with 250 enrolled.

"We also have two State schools with an enrollment of 30 each.

"During this period of time 262 adults have been taught to read and write. Not only have they been taught to read and write but have been taught the art of home-making. The schools have all been working on the home unit; sub-units consisting of health, citizenship, recreation and operations of the home, have been taught books.

"Through activities of this program approximately one hundred children, both white and colored, found upon a recent survey of various school districts, have been returned to the various public schools of the county. In some instances a number of these children had never attended any public schools.
