IS NOW PUBLISHED HERE

The first issue of the "Market News Service" was published here on Thursday of last week under a Barnwell data line by J. B. Owens, representative of the Buenu of Agricultural Economics. These issues will be made daily on cucumbers throughout the season and will follow up with drilly issues on cantaloupes and watermulcos.

The growers and buyers of this section have been working for the past couple of years trying to get this acryice established in Barnwell so as to enable them to get the market on the day issued. Heretofore the news has been issued from Denmark. which, because of the afternoon mail service, delayed the arrivel of the bulletin in Barnwell until the next day. However, under the present setup, not only will the Barnwell farmers and buyers receive their copies on the date isseud, but there will be no inconvenience to the growers of the Denmark section as a mail connection in the afternoon is available.

These bulletins are of inestimable value to those interested in the handling of produce, both from the growers' and buyers' standpoint. It lists the carloadings from the territory; the price on the markets; the cars on the markets; the cars rolling and other necessary data. This is another forward step by interested local persons in the advancement and development of the Barnwell produce maket.
