A small show-room for dresses and suits adjoins the reception room, and here an entire wardrobe from the most important garment to the minutest detail may be had.

To the left is the "L" shaped display room for the finest assortment of caskets and vaults to be found anywhere. The entire color scheme of white walls

and ceiling with cream trim has been adhered to, and the lighting is indirect throughout. The floors are entirely of mahogany.

Opening from the right of the reception room is the slumber room, where rose reflectors are used.

To the right of the slumber room is the embalming room in spotless white, known as the preparation room, furnished with the most modern hydraulic embalming tables and equipment. At the extreme rear is an orderly store room and 3-car garage.

Colored Service Modern in Every Respect.

From the right side of the building is the entrance to the colored reception room, connected with the office by a hall-

way. Immediately behind the colored reception room is the colored slumber room and prep-

aration room, the latter furnished with modern embalming equipment.

The equipment now comprises three ser-

vice cars, two trucks, two ambulances and three hearses.

The first year in business he conducted forty-two funerals; last year, two hundred and sixty-four.

In addition to manufacturing a re-inforced concrete vault, absolutely water-proof and airtight, which is attracting wide attention, Mr. Peeples is district manager for the McNeal Marble Co., the largest in the South and one of the oldest in America.
