Primary Elections.

The object of paramount importance to every patriotic man in South Carolina to day and for all time should be the reservation of the unity and solidarity of the democratic party. We do not shink that this proposition will admit of discussion, at least for the present, while the disclosures of the enormous radical now constituted, in our county, who would not admit the proposition with which we start to be incontrovertible. But there are men in our ranks good and true men-who differ as to the mode by which this unity shall best be maintained. We think that by following out the true principle upon which democracy as a distinctive political creed is based very little trouble will be encountered in reaching satisfactory and wholesome ends.

The great underlying principle of democracy is that the voice of the majority must, and of right ought to prevail; that the people are the sovereigns with whom all power resides, and that men elected to office are but servants placed there to do the will of their sovereigns.

There were many reasons why, at the fast election, a nominating convention should have been called into requisition and that made the action of that body binding upon every democrat, which de not exist to-day. The radical party grown rich on the white tax payers of our downtrodden country, were insolen in the pride of impossible defeat, and presented a solid, unbroken front, which required care, caution, pluck and invinrible determination to overcome. Our deserter from our ranks at that time would have encouraged the enemy and weakened us correspondingly. Our only hope lay in pursuing, with childish faith, ne path that was blazed for us by the convention of delegates which placed the ricket in nomination. That this was ione the 7th of November, 1876 proved. We do not think that the radicals, as an organized body, will trouble us again in Barnwell. But we do believe that there is yet danger in the fragments of that party. As yet the "colored troops" are an unknown quantity in their influence on the next election. We cannot sup pose that they have suddenly conceived any great love for their white neighbors. towards whom but yesterday, as it were, they felt so bitterly. They are not of the highest order of humanity, and we ean hardly expect them to manifest nobler sentiments than the white man iscapable of. No, the man who places any faith in the political reformation of the average negro, will be roughly aroused from the silly delusion before the ides of the next November. The negro cannot realize yet that democratic rule is a blessing to him as well as to the white man, and he is sleeplessly on the watch for any opportunity by which he can, without exciting suspicion, wreak his vengeance for an imagined trespass on his new rights as a freeman. As we have said, it is not, in our opinion, at all probable that the radicals will put up a candidate at the next election; but wherever the opportunity presents itself to sow the seeds of dissension and discord in our ranks the occasion will find them busily engaged at the work. Knowing it to be impossible for them to win, they will leave no stone unturned to defeat their must powerful enemy—the democratic party, well knowing that if they succeed in this design the integrity of the organigation will be lost and their opportunity

for ultimate success in sight. We very much fear that the result of mother nominating convention will be the re-establishment of the radical supremacy, than which it is beyond our magination to conceive of any horror more to be dreaded. The people are not willing to allow one or two hundred men to name their candidates and be allowed no appeal from that decision; and what is more, the people will not submit to it, however honest and impartial the men may be who constitute that convention. We do not feel called upon to censure men for feeling this way; because we BBOTS AKO SHOES, believe the elective franchise to be great and glorious right, which every an should be allowed to exercise for himself. That the said county is greatly erippled in its finances by the vast increase in the expenses of transporting to and providing for prisoners in the jail of the adjoining county of Aiken, which costs annually from eighteen hundred to two thousand dollars more than if the prisoners were kept in our own fail

That our county is poorly able to bear this increase of expense and the public service generally suffers for the want of suitable public buildings.

Wherefore, your memorialists pray that an act be passed at once authorizing your memorialists to levy a special tax and to construct suitable public buildings under such regulations as to your honorable bodies may seem wise, And your memorialists will ever pray &c.
