The spirit of improvement still continues in our town. Since writing you last the mercantile firm of Messrs. Hartzog & Johnson have concluded to separate; Mr. Samuel J. Hartzog will continue business in the front portion of the same building; Mr. Johnson is having the rear portion of the building newly fitted up, with the door opening on Bamberg street, next to Messrs. Rice & Copeland, and will about the 1st of January open a stock of goods to supply any who may give him a call. I see from the papers that they are having some contention in the general assembly in regard to the usury law. I am aware that much can be said for and against fixing a rate of interest. Under the old law fixing the rate at seven per cent. our State was prosperous. It was argued that if the usury law was repealed and capitalists were allowed a higher rate of interest for the use of their money, that capital would flow into the State. This prediction has not been fulfilled. I am of opinion that higher interest than seven per cent. is ruinous to the debtor, yet I am aware that no law can be enacted that will meet with universal approval and all laws can be evaded in some way or other. I believe that a majority in this vicinity are of my opinion. It is thought by some that the State is threatened with another insurance deposit law. It is said such a law will drive insurance from the State. If it has reference to fire insurance, I have not much to say, but if it refers to life insurance, the sooner it is driven from the State, the better, for many of the companies have failed and all their fair promises of safe investment was a fraud upon the policy holders, they have been grossly deceived and swindled out of their hard earnings by palmy agents and officers with high salaries, and failures and defalcations have become quite common. Now while I am writing the stillness of the night is broken by some six pistol shots at the bar-room of S. J. Inabnet. Two men were wounded severely, though not dangerously, Mr. W. J. Jones of this place and Mr. H. Deer of Allendale. We withhold particulars for prudential reasons as the case will most probably be carried to the courts. These sad occurrences are a standing commentary against this bar-room drinking custom. We believe therefore that more stringent laws should be passed regulating the traffic, than

now exist. We know that the masses are opposed to prohibitory laws regulating morals; but it is our candid opinion that all laws should as far as possible be so framed as a preventive as well as a punishment for crime.
