THE MEN OF THE KANE EXPEDITION. We have already stated that eight of the survivors of the expedition to the Arctic zone under the command of Dr. Kane, were in Philadelphia at the time of the obsequies when the mortal remains of the great captain were interred. The Boston Telegraph contains the following interesting information in regard to the whereabouts and occupation of the whole party. In the first place, of those who attended the funeral of Dr. Kane: Henry Brooks, first officer, now boatwain U. S. N., New York; Wm. Murton, steward, now assistant U. S. Marshal, Philadelphia; William Godfrey, seaman, now driving omnibus, Philadelphia; Thomas Hickney, cabin boy, now in Charles Smith's foundry, Philadelphia; G. Stephenson, seaman, now store-keeper, steamer Baltic; H. Goodfellow, captain's clerk, now residing in Philadelphia; Amos Bassall, deck officer, now farmer, Delaware county, near Philadelphia; Dr. L. I. Hayes, surgeon and naturalist, now residing in Philadelphia.

The other survivors are: J. Wall Wilson, sailing-master, now at New York; J. McGary, J. Blake, G. Riley, and G. Whipple, now at sea; August Sostag, astronomer, now in Mexico; J. Carl Peterson, interpreter, now at the Uppernavik; and Hans, hunter, now with the Esquimaux of Smith's Sound. The dead are: J. M. Baker, died on ship; Pierre Schepert, died on ship Christian Ohlsen, from injury received on ice in lifting the bow of one of the boats, on the return; Dr. E. C. Kane, died at Havana, February 16, 1857.
