thing from your state since that time with great interest, hoping to learn of his final election, since he was without doubt the hearty choice of your best people. \* \* \* We wish so much that these election questions might be settled harmoniously and satisfactorily to all, so that our whole people could go to work again with a will. All with whom I meet would much prefer Tilden's election, if a near approach to this state of feeling could be reached. Whichever way it is settled, so there is general satisfaction, our common people will say *amen*, and be perfectly content. Altogether I am quite sure that the majority of the Republicans of New England would be glad to know of Tilden's election to-morrow morning. I feel this to be a fact, and I think it a hopeful sign."
