Foreign Notes.

General Garibaldi's health is in a most critical state.

Lucca made \$50,000 by her farewell tour in Germany.

Sweden has declined to take part in the Paris Exhibition of 1878.

Sir Walter Scott's house, No. 25 George's Square, Edinburgh, has been sold for £3,752.

A dispatch from Berlin says the goods traffic has been resumed on all the Russian railways.

Mr. Adrian Stephens, the inventor of the steam whistle, died in England, at the age of eighty-one.

Speaking of the Canadian meat trade, the London Times says the new venture already appears to have conferred a boon on the working classes.

Rev. Mr. Denton, who has traveled in European Turkey, says that in sixty years the Mussulman population will have perished and that only the Christian will remain.

At Hamburg tobacco sweepings are mixed with alcohol, and when the nicotine is extracted the fluid is sent to England, where it turns Yorkshire cabbage leaves into nice tobacco.

A handbill, signed by a Rev. Mr. Baxter, is being extensively circulated in London, England, announcing the approaching translation to Heaven of 144,000 Christians without dying.

The Archbishop of York, in a recent temperance sermon, said that £140,000,000 were spent for intoxicating drink in Great Britain; and to give an idea of what this large sum meant, he said that you might lay £30 upon every letter of the Bible before you would exhaust this amount.

None but a Frenchman could write such a dedication as Offenbach has placed in his book in compliment to his wife. It is this: "You have desired that I should make a book from these letters written at odd times. This is the first sorrow you have caused me. Still I bear you so little ill-will therefor that I dedicate you this volume, not for what it is or may be worth, but because I love to write everywhere my esteem and affection for you."

A firm of umbrella-makers in Glasgow have lately filled an order for forty enormous sunshades, which are to be sent as presents to African chiefs. Some of the parasols are thirty feet in circumference, and the rest about eighteen feet. They are covered with rich, variegated damask silk, fringed around the edges, ornamented at the top with gilt balls and lined with finished cloth. The handles, which are of lancewood, are armed with spikes for tenting purposes, and a bayonet joint on each stick renders the whole more portable.

A TRAMP'S LOVE FOR LABOR.—The aversion of the lordly tramp to any form of manual labor receives fresh proof almost daily. An ordinary able-bodied tramp will work harder, suffer greater privations and expend more brain force in an effort to beat somebody out of a nickel than would be required of him to earn an honest living for a week. At Logan, Ohio, a few days since a number of tramps were arrested and placed in the lock-up preparatory to being put to work on the roads, according to a pleasant custom in vogue among the miners. The haughty instincts of the tramps rebelled at the prospect of shoveling. It was for them a moment of awful trial, but ingenuity, born of desperation, triumphed. In their lonely prison cells the tramps carefully removed what clothing they had and stuffed it in the roaring stove, and when the cruel taskmasters came to marshal them forth with pick and shovel, it needed no arguments to convince them that the prisoners were in no fit condition to face the winds of winter. Our correspondent does not relate whether the waggish vagrants are to be supplied with clothing at the expense of the citizens, or kept on indefinitely in their present state

around the warm stove in the lock-up. It will occur at once, though, to all intelligent persons, that they have by this happy discovery virtually abolished involuntary servitude in cold climates, and for this they will no doubt receive the honest gratitude of their kind.—Cincinnati Gazette.
