THE TONE OF THE PRESS ON THE TRIBUNAL'S LAST DECISION.

A Grand Chorus of Condemnation.

False, Unfounded and Libellous.

The grand jury of Anderson county in their late presentment make the following complimentary allusions to ex-Governor Chamberlain: to report that from their own observations in various portions of Anderson county, as well as from all the reports they have heard from other persons, the election held on the 7th of last November was perfectly fair and peaceable. No information concerning violence and fraud has reached the grand jury, and we congratulate the whole people of our county upon the general disposition manifested by both political parties to appeal to a free ballot for the expression of the will of the people of this county.

And in this connection the grand jury beg leave to present ex-Governor Daniel H. Chamberlain for slander, deriding the good name and reputation of Anderson county in the proclamation issued by him pending the late election, in which he proclaimed that lawlessness and violence existed throughout the entire State, for the purpose of intimidating our people with a view to enable him to secure his own re-election. We pronounce his statements in that proclamation as false, unfounded and libellous so far as it relates to the people of Anderson county. We beg leave to present further that we are informed as a matter of public notoriety that the said Daniel H. Chamberlain is and has been exercising and pretending to exercise the powers of governor in opposition to General Wade Hampton, the candidate who was elected and installed by the legal House of Representatives, and is today the rightful governor of South Carolina, and that the said Chamberlain's claim to the office is founded on fraud and force.

We beg leave further to present to your Honor the fact that the offices of county treasurer and auditor for this county are vacant by virtue of the late incumbents, B. D. Dean and T. J. Webb, having been removed by his Excellency, Governor Wade Hampton, and that no appointments for said offices have yet been made, wherefore we respectfully suggest that your Honor direct the said late incumbents forthwith to turn over all moneys, books, records and furniture belonging to either of their offices to O. H. P. Fant, Chairman of the Board of County Commissioners for Anderson county, and that they take a receipt therefor.
