South Carolina News.

Chamberlain has not collected one dollar of tax in Anderson county.

Between 1,200 and 1,500 valentines passed through the Columbia postoffice on the 14th instant.

The oat crop in Kershaw county was seriously damaged by the recent cold weather.

Partridges sell for five cents apiece in Camden, and are in demand at that price. They are in demand in Charleston at fifteen cents apiece.

On account of the unsettled state of affairs Judge Wiggin notified Sheriff Black, of Colleton, that he will hold no court this week.

The Aiken Schuetzen Club are making extensive preparations for their coming Fest, provided Grant's order doesn't apply.

The negroes in Newberry are dying rapidly of consumption. Six died of it last year on Mr. W. Y. Fair's place—four men and two children.

Application has been made to Governor Hampton for commission for the officers of the Abbeville Rifle Club, and the enrollment of the Club as a part of the State militia.

Nine distillers were brought in on Tuesday last and lodged in the jail at Greenville. They were captured in the mountain country by revenue officers, aided by a detachment of United States troops.

Sheriff Doby left Camden last week for Bertow, Jefferson county, Ga. He goes after Turnage, who shot Rowell last spring, a requisition for him having been made by Governor Hampton upon Governor Colquitt, of Georgia.

Some time last week, Mr. Wm. Whittle, living in the Cloud's Creek section, Edgefield county, lost by fire his gin-house, running gear, three bales of cotton, and the seed from twenty-three bales. Match in cotton. No insurance.

On the night of Tuesday, the 13th instant, the new and handsomely furnished dwelling house of Mr. John L. Perry, about a mile and a half from Ridge Spring, in Edgefield county, was destroyed by fire—with a large part of its contents. The work of an incendiary.

An elderly lady of Anderson county walked from near Moffattsville to Anderson, a distance of about fourteen miles, to pay her ten per cent. tax to Hampton. She said, "Some persons say we will lose our money, but I am willing to give mine to Hampton anyway."

A negro named Whitfield Mays, who lives on Mr. Louis Crede's place, three miles from Newberry, C. H., took one of Mr. Crede's mules from its stable Sunday night, carried it about a hundred yards in the woods and cut its throat, severing the arteries of the neck.

Starvation has actually set in with a number of poor colored people in Abbeville county. They are clothed in rags, without friends or credit, and there's nothing to steal. Patterson and Chamberlain cleaned out the concern long ago. The severe winter we have had, the low price of cotton and the disturbed condition of the country have led to the hardships through which those people are now passing.

Captain Perrin, of Abbeville, has collected \$9,932.95. Of this amount \$6,887.10 was paid in obedience to Hampton's ten per cent. call, and the balance, \$3,145.85 for the county. One thousand, four hundred and eighty-seven receipts were issued for the county and two thousand and seven for the State. One hundred and ninety four colored people have paid up, and others are coming forward with their contributions as fast as they can raise the money.

The literary societies at Due West have chosen their representatives for the next annual commencement exercises in Linking College. Mensis.

W. H. and E. C. Frierson have been elected Sophomore orators, and Mess J. L. McLin, and W. O. Bradley, Junior essayists in the Euphemian Society. Mr. W. T. Matthews will appear as Junior and Mr. W. L. Phillips as Senior orator. The Philomatheans have chosen Messrs. A. E. Miller and J. M. McQueen as Sophomore orators, Messrs. J. T. Chalmers and H. W. Harris, as Junior essayists, and Mr. H. W. Harris as Junior orator.

The coroner of Williamsburg county held an inquest last week on the body of a colored girl named Dolly Jackson. She left her house about sundown on the tenth of December last to gather some wood and was never seen after that although her parents hunted for her everywhere. Last Saturday morning some colored men, hunting in the woods about three miles from Jackson's house, discovered some human bones and clothes, and suspecting that they might be the remains of the missing girl, notified the father of the fact, who, upon going with them to the spot, recognized the clothes of his child. The coroner's jury rendered a verdict that the deceased was frozen to death.

The citizens of Newberry are making strenuous efforts to secure the return of Newberry College to their town. At a public meeting, held Monday before last, the following resolution was adopted: "Resolved. That a committee of ten be appointed by the chairman to solicit subscriptions, and to take such other action as may be deemed proper, to secure the location of Newberry College in the town of Newberry, and that said committee report to an adjourned meeting of the citizens of the town in the Court house next Monday evening."
