South Carolina News.

The income of the City of Columbia last week was \$381.70.

The roads in Kershaw county are said to be almost impassable.

Incendiaries burned two churches in Oconee county recently.

There was snow in Yorkville on Monday before last.

Mr. Speights, of the Greenville News, has taken possession of the Greenville Hotel.

Eggs were selling at Pickens Court-house last week at six cents per dozen.

The whites and blacks in Newberry are organizing a Thief Detective Company.

Governor Hampton has been elected an honorary member of the Aiken Schuetzen Club.

Lancaster has paid \$1,955 of the Hampton tax. The total number of taxpayers is 976, of which 41 are colored.

One thousand and fifteen colored men of Barnwell county had paid the Hampton tax, up to Monday night last.

Cotton will be largely planted in the Ninety-Six section this year. The farmers are actively preparing for the planting season.

Not more than half as much guano has been sold at Abbeville up to this time as was sold last year. The planters are ashamed to be seen hauling it home.

Eighteen hundred and forty-eight receipts for the Hampton tax contribution have been issued by the special agent of Anderson, aggregating \$4,385 30.

The Aiken Protection Union Poultry Society offers a reward of one thousand dollars for the best plan for a burglar proof chicken house.

The Bamberg Guards, of Bamberg, have elected their officers, and will make application to Governor Hampton for commissions at an early day.

On Thursday evening, as the Port Royal Railroad train was nearing Augusta, some one fired a rifle shot which entered the half open door of the baggage car. No one was hurt.

One thousand two hundred and ninety-eight taxpayers of York county, including 190 colored men, have paid \$4,926 taxes to the Hampton government. Chamberlain has collected nothing.

Mr. Sams, special agent in Beaufort for collecting the Hampton tax, completed his circuit last Thursday at Brunson's, with the exception of two or three appointments in the upper portions of the county. He has collected \$2,910 20.

The new board of county commissioners of Darlington are not making a great deal out of their office so far. They assemble daily, but have nothing to do and no money to do it with.

On Friday before last an attempt was made by a number of negroes to bull-doze the court of Trial Justice Yates, at Aiken, by an effort to rescue a prisoner, but the justice promptly summoned a posse and put the bull-dozers to route.

The dwelling house belonging to Mr. M. A. Cason and occupied by Mr. C. L. Smith, was burned down at Hodges on last Wednesday night about 9 o'clock. Insurance, \$2,000. The house was a new one, located about half a mile up the Abbeville Branch Railroad.

Col. J. E. Calhoun's tenants pay taxes on the land they occupy and cultivate, at the rate of ten cents an acre. He has about fifteen thousand acres in Abbeville county, on which are sixty-five tenants. He requires tenants to pay this tax in order that they may feel some of the oppression of a robbing government.

Judge Townsend agrees with Judge Mackey in saying that the concurrent opinion of Justices Willard and Wright on the late question regarding the discharge of

the writ is the legal action of the Supreme Court; and that Justice Wright alone cannot cancel his decision.

A most disastrous fire occurred in Newberry on Thursday last, originating in Pool's Hotel. The wind blew a gale, and the splendid efforts of the citizens, white and colored, were unavailing. The loss is estimated at \$150,000, with but partial insurance.

Mr. F. W. Cooper, a citizen residing in the outskirts of Timmons-ville, was burnt out on the night of Sunday before last. His dwelling, smokehouse and another out-building were all consumed by fire. He was fortunate enough, however, to save nearly all his furniture. Nothing is known as to the origin of the fire.

On four successive nights of last week attempts were made to burn various houses on the premises of Mr. C. E. McPherson, who lives just inside the Marion line, a few miles southeast of Florence. The houses fired were his smokehouse, ginhouse, kitchen and an outhouse. They were only saved by the watchfulness of Mr. McPherson and his neighbors. The neighborhood is on the alert.

Last Monday morning about 10 o'clock, the valuable mill-house of Mr. J. W. DePass, situated about one mile to the southeast of Camden, was destroyed by fire. The origin of the fire is unknown, but is thought to be the act of an incendiary. So rapid was the progress of the conflagration that Mr. DePass, who was in the building when the fire was discovered, barely had time to escape.

Mrs. M. M. White, of Abbeville, has just finished a wonderful quilt. The article is of silk made of patches only a little larger than a nickel piece, the total number being 9,250; the busting stitches are estimated at 92,500, while the sewing stitches are set down at 832,500. It is believed after careful calculation, that the handling of the separate pieces in putting this work together, will reach the enormous number of 45,250 times. Mrs. White has worked at this quilt more or less every day for the last two years, and for the past two months has done nothing else.
