News of the Day.
With the past four weeks, less than a dozen dead infants have been picked up by the police on the streets and alleys of New York.

Secretary Schurz talks to the army of applicants for office in three languages—English, German and French, and still he fails to make them happy.

A Louisville concern, known as the Kentucky Cash Distribution Company is bankrupt. One drawing took place, and another was extensively advertised.

At Paterson, N. J., on Wednesday, the St. Charles Hotel, opposite the Erie depot, was burned. The boarders barely escaped with their lives, some jumping from the second story and breaking their limbs.

The suit against the Protection Life Insurance Company, of Chicago, for injunction and the appointment of a receiver, has been abandoned. The company's answer was complete and satisfactory.

Four negro prisoners, confined in Aiken jail, for minor offences, escaped on Wednesday evening last, by cutting through the wall with a piece of hoop iron. Two were recaptured.

Nine stores and dwellings, with the Town Hall, at Enfield, N. C., were totally destroyed by fire last week. Loss over \$50,000, partially covered by insurance. This was the largest ever known in that section. Several families are homeless and almost without clothing.

Three members who have heretofore occupied seats in the Packard House of Representatives, Frank J. Dairy, of St. Laundry; Bernard Davies, of Point Coupee, and Romeo, of Iberia, have been sworn in as members of the Nicholls Legislature.

General Sherman says that it is not his purpose to parley further with the Indians, or to delay the intended campaign while negotiations between Spotted Tail and the hostile Indians are pending. Supplies are now being rapidly accumulated, and every thing is being put in readiness for the coming campaign, which will be opened as soon as possible.

The Missouri Legislature has passed what it calls a "Sewing-machine bill," which imposes penalties upon sewing-machine owners who leave goods on the installment plan with widows and poor people and upon whom the installment for small residues when the final balances are not promptly forthcoming.

A shooting affray occurred at Topoka, Kansas, on Wednesday between J. Clarke Swayse, editor of the *Topoka Times*, in which Mr. Swayse was killed. The testimony before the coroner's jury showed that Swayse drew his revolver first, and that both fired simultaneously. Swayse received only a slight flesh wound on one cheek. Swayse was shot through the heart.

The Nevada Legislature, which has just adjourned, passed an act for the punishment of wife-beaters. It provides that one convicted shall be tied to a post in some public place, and there remain exposed to the jeers of the passers-by for a period of several hours. A plea on the breast will indicate the offense. Two chronic wife-beaters are now under arrest, and the efficacy of the new law will have a prompt test.

The Louisiana Commission consisted of ex-Governor Brown, of Tennessee; Wayne McFeigh, a lawyer who was minister to Turkey in 1875; and a law of Simon Cameron, and a pronounced Republican, Gen. J. M. Hawley, of Connecticut, a moderate Republican, Gen. M. H. Hurlbut, of Kentucky, an emphatic Republican, and Judge C. R. Lawrence, of Illinois, who was prominent Republican candidate for Senator last winter, and formerly Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Illinois. The Commission will be instructed after the President has consulted with Vice-President Wheeler.

Honors to Hampton.
Phonically the whole of the day crowds of men stood around the pavement in front of Willard's waiting to catch a glimpse of Governor Hampton (Chamberlain), who has been here all the week, comes and goes without any one knowing or caring who he is. The contrast between the object and the subject paid to the two is very marked. The instant that Governor Hampton appears in public people rush up and surround him. Two of the most enterprising livery-stable keepers of Washington sent to the hotel to-day the handiest turn-outs in their establishments, and placed them at Governor Hampton's disposal. Governor Hampton could not ride in both carriages at once, and the rivalry on the subject between the two stable-keepers as to who should have him became so intense that it ended in fist fights. Dr. Mary Walker was one of those who lined the promenade in homage to Governor Hampton. She endeavored but without success, to carry her card to Governor Hampton's room. Finally, she espied Senator Gordon and asked him to secure her an interview, but he informed her that Governor Hampton's time was so much occupied that he could not see any one. But this would not satisfy Dr. Mary, and she planted herself at the foot of the stairs to intercept Governor Hampton as he came down. Colonel Calk, the proprietor of the hotel went to her and told her she must leave. She said this was insulting, and she threatened that if she would dress in the apparel of her sex she would not expose herself to insult. At this she drew back and aimed her eye at the Colonel, who retreated in good order. Then, after giving him a little piece of her mind, she departed. The coast being clear, Governor Hampton then came down stairs, and he and Senator Gordon took a ride around the city.—*Cor. Richmond Dispatch, March 30.*
