The Major opened his remarks by reading the correspondence between Chamberlain and Governor Hampton (published elsewhere), and then read the following telegram which had just been received:

"Chamberlain has just turned over the executive department and State house to Governor Hampton's private secretary. It will not be occupied till it has been thoroughly cleaned out."

The Major then went on in a speech, which was well received and frequently applauded. Speeches were then made by Col. F. J. Cameron, Mr. Jno. S. Reynolds and Mr. A. M. Mackey, in the order named. The crowd dispersed in great good humor and amid cheers for our governor.

FAIRFIELD FIRE ENGINE COMPANY.—A highly interesting meeting of the above-named organization was held on Tuesday night last. After the adoption of the Tribute of Respect to the memory of its late President, Captain Dwight, which is published in this issue, a general discussion was entered into in regard to the condition of the company and its future prospects.
