The Radical ex-Clerk of the Court of Laurens has been committed to jail for refusing to surrender his books and papers. Leaf by leaf the roses fall.

Judge Carpenter recognized Hampton as governor during court last week at Camden. Solicitor Abney, who was elected in November, was permitted to exercise his official functions. This recognition of Hampton is growing monotonous.

John Gibson has set an example to the people of his race and party. His efforts in behalf of peace and harmony between the races will be remembered.

The heroic remedy in Columbia is the proper one. There should be no temporizing with the corrupt leaders of the Radical party. If any of them endeavor to make trouble, they should be pushed unceremoniously out of the way. They staked their all in a desperate conspiracy and lost. They have no rights as officials, for they were defeated. They should be taught that the day for impertinent presumption has passed.

Now that Chamberlain and Packard are both out of a job, we would suggest to them to make a rush for Mexico, and set up a claim for the Presidency of that Republic. The land of the Aztecs has three Presidential claimants already, and would not mind an addition of two more, besides which the Mexicans might take kindly to Chamberlain and Packard as being the newest comers. The carpet-bagger is capable of teaching a thing or two to even the Mexican brigand.

Intelligence from Columbia is that the Legislature met and both houses organized and adjourned. Gleaves at first hung around and seemed disposed to contest Lieutenant-Governor Simpson's seat, but the latter calmly informed him that such a proceeding would result disastrously. Lieutenant Governor Simpson is not a man to be trifled with, and the State is to be congratulated upon having him as presiding officer of the Senate. The Radical senate will be powerless for harm.

James Redpath has addressed a letter to the colored people of the South, advising them to join the Democratic party, as Hayes has sold them out. Redpath's only notoriety consists in his having written bloody shirt letters to newspapers. He figured in Columbia not long since as an attache of the Senatorial investigating committee and from that place concocted libels on our State. Redpath's impudence is amusing. Not one colored man in a thousand knows anything of the self-constituted advisor, or cares what he says. For the first time, however, in his life, Redpath has given the colored people sound advice.

**Carpenter's Resignation.**

Chloroform Carpenter has resigned his position as Collector of Internal Revenue, on the ground that it will be impossible for him to live in South Carolina under a Democratic Administration. The Register stamps his assertion as a falsehood and shows that even this obnoxious Radical has plied his calling unmolested for eight years. He could not even get a burglar to rob him, and was reduced to the necessity of robbing himself.

The Register is rather hard on Chlory in pronouncing him a falsifier in this particular. The reason given by Carpenter may be valid although it contains a damning admission. The logic of it is this: The Democrats will put a stop to stealing. Those who have lived solely by stealing heretofore will, therefore, find it impossible to exist longer under a Democratic regime. They must leave the State. Chlory may include himself in this category.

Another possible solution is that the Internal Revenue agents have been protected, heretofore, by Federal bayonets in their raids, and the persons they despoiled could make no resistance. The President has forbidden the further use of troops for this purpose and says that the collectors must summon posse and make seizures themselves. The post of profit is henceforth the post of danger. Chlory might be compelled to fight for a living; and fighting mountain distillers is not the safest business in the world. This may be another valid reason why Carpenter finds it impossible to live longer in South Carolina under a Democratic regime. We trust that the Register will not imagine that we are turning Radical because we have championed Carpenter. We believe in giving every one his due. And we submit that the Register is hasty in assuming that Carpenter can pursue his peculiar avocation longer in South Carolina, and that he is therefore a falsifier when he says he cannot.
