To Thomas W. Woodward, Francis Gerig, George Holly, Commissioners of Election for Fairfield County:

WHEREAS, Daniel Bird and John Gibson, who, at the General Election held November 7th, 1876, were chosen members of the House of Representatives for the Election District of Fairfield County, to serve for two years, has since said election resigned. And, whereas, the Constitution of the State of South Carolina directs that in such case a Writ of Election shall be issued by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, for the purpose of filling the vacancy thus occasioned, for the remainder of the term for which the Members so resigning were elected to serve:

This writ together with your return of the election to be held under it, have before the House of Representatives at its next meeting after the election.
