**ASSOCIATE JUSTICE.**—The Democratic members of the Legislature held a caucus on Thursday night, for the selection of a candidate for the position of associate justice of the supreme court, made vacant by the promotion of Judge Willard to the chief justiceship. The following is the result: First ballot—McIvor, 27; Haskell, 19; Wallace, 12; Kershaw, 12; Tracy, 6. Second ballot—McIvor, 30; Haskell, 25; Kershaw, 11; Wallace, 10. Third ballot—McIvor, 37; Haskell, 10; Wallace, 9; Kershaw, 9. Before the declaration of the result of the third ballot numbers of members changed their votes, until McIvor's vote reached 49—more than enough to declare him the choice of the caucus—and he was so declared, when an adjournment followed.

The election on Friday resulted, of course, in the choice of Col. Henry McIvor. Judge McIvor is a lawyer of unusual ability and of great

prominence in the eastern section of the State, where he resides. He was formerly circuit solicitor, and discharged the duties of that office with great credit to himself and honor to the profession of which he is a member. He has never taken an active part in politics, and is conservative in all his views. He will prove an able and upright judge. Cheraw, his native place, may well be proud of him, and gratified at his election.

**THE STATE UNIVERSITY.**—The following-named gentlemen have been elected trustees of the University: Rev. E. J. Meynardie, R. W. Boyd, B. F. Perry, James H. Rion, F. W. McMaster, C. H. Simonton, J. D. Blanding. Governor Hampton is *ex officio* chairman of the Board. The Legislature has made a most admirable selection, and the choice of these gentlemen we regard as the first step in the work of restoring the University to its former position of honor and usefulness. The first act of the new Board should be the removal of all the present professors (?) and the election of persons fitted, by education, talent and character, to fill the different chairs. The University, as it now stands, is a disgrace to the State and a source of disgust to all decent people, and the sooner it is reformed the better. We favor the *immediate* removal of all the present faculty, and the vacating of all the University buildings by the whole crew—professors, students, "school marns" and all. By the opening of the next term—October 1st—the institution should be a condition to receive the patronage of the people. An entire new faculty should be elected, and every effort made to place the University as high in the favor of the white people of the State as it was before the Radicals got possession of it.
