In Turkey, when the sultan was dissatisfied with any pasha or other superior officer, or wished to obtain his wealth, it was usual for him to send a messenger to the doomed man, who politely communicated to him the imperial desire that his death should take place and produced a warrant to that effect, together with a tough bow-string (made of cat-gut) which—the action being instantly suited to the word—was thereupon placed around the neck to produce strangulation.

At one time great culprits were fastened to four horses, a limb to each horse, and the horses being urged different ways, pulled limb from limb. The last person who so suffered in Europe was Robert Francisco Damians, for an attempt on the life of Louis XV., in 1757.

ACROSS THE WATER.

The bill suppressing vivisection has been defeated in the House of Commons.

The weekly statement of the Imperial Bank of Germany shows a decrease of 3,900,000 marks.

From all accounts, the Jews and Christians prefer the rule of the Sultan to the tender mercies of the Czar.

The Swedish painter, Carl Petter Lohmann, recently deceased, accomplished much during his life of eighty-three years. He painted no less than 4,800 portraits.

No important change has taken place in the position of the parties in the Turco Russian war. England has sent a letter to Russia which is thought by many to mean war in case the Czar becomes too aggressive; but the authorities are reticent.

A story told in the American colony at Dresden is of an encounter between one of the young lieutenants of the army and a stalwart American. They jostled on the sidewalk, and the officer drew his sword. Thereupon the young American knocked him down violently enough to stun him, and having broken the sword over his knee, laid his card between the pieces and proceeded calmly on his way.

Dr. Sehliemann, the eminent German-American who has made so many important discoveries at Mycene, is a self-made man. He began life as a shop boy, was subsequently a cabin-boy, then a clerk, and spent his best days in Russian commerce. In addition to amassing a large fortune, he has mastered the English, French, Dutch, Spanish, Italian, Portuguese, Russian, Swedish, Polish, Greek, and Arabic languages.

The population statistics of London for the past quarter have just been issued. During that period 288,485 children were born and 182,489 persons died. The birth-rate will therefore be 56 2/10 per 1,000 and the death-rate 22 1/10 per 1,000. Of all the emigration during the past three months forty-eight per cent. has gone to America and thirty-five per cent. to Australia.

A British color sergeant shot down and overrun by the enemy once seized in his teeth a corner of the flag, and his jaws locked upon it in the rigidity of death. The enemy cut it away from him, leaving a bit of it between his fixed teeth. Subsequently the standard was retaken, and ever since the flag of that regiment is made with that little piece carefully cut out, in memory of the sergeant who was buried with the fragment in his mouth.

Queen Victoria has caused a monumental cross to be erected at Frogmore, in Windsor Park, in memory of Lady Augusta Stanley. It is of fine blue Cairngall granite, all polished, and is beautifully en-

riched on the front and sides with entwined ornaments, after the style of the early Christian crosses that may be seen in the west of Scotland. It stands upon a rock base, or unhewn block of granite, and the total height is about seven feet. Its site is chosen in the private grounds at Frogmore, in front of the mausoleum of her Royal Highness, the Duchess of Kent, the Queen's mother. The following is inscribed in gold letters on the stem of the cross: "To the dear memory of Lady Augusta Stanley, fifth daughter of Thomas Bruce, seventh Earl of Elgin and Kincardine, this cross is erected by Queen Victoria, in grateful and affectionate remembrance of her faithful labors for thirty years in the service of the Queen, the Duchess of Kent, and the Royal Family. Born April 3, 1822. Died March 1, 1876."

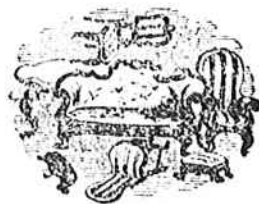
