too ready to be led by designing and unprincipled men who became by force of superior opportunities their leaders. When I say this, I desire particularly to add that I do not cast more blame upon the colored than upon the white leaders of the Republican party in South Carolina. Upon the whole, I think my own race has as much to answer for in connection with bad leadership in that State as the colored race. The result is the same. Bad leaders and ignorant followers could not work out the problem of good government. This has been the great obstacle and hindrance to the success of the Republican party in the Southern States, and it may be set down as the principal cause of our overthrow. The difficulty was that a majority of those who undertook to lead the Republican party in South Carolina made a profession of politics and lived accordingly."

Upon the subject of the resources of the State, Mr. Chamberlain used the following language:

"I have had political differences with the people of South Carolina that were wide and deep, but upon this subject of the resources of the Commonwealth, I have never entertained a doubt. South Carolina offers the most inviting inducements to the emigrant. Her resources are almost indescribable. Her cotton, long staple and upland, her rice and corn, her facilities for production and manufacture, are absolutely unsurpassed. I had a dream of identifying myself with the development of these great resources; not, if you will allow me to say, so much as a matter of personal ambition as of satisfaction at seeing a State capable of taking her place among the great productive agencies of the Union; but the dream is past. I have sought other fields, and probably shall find my future in New York. I should have been glad to have participated in the results that must come from the energy, industry and growth of South Carolina, for she is Massachusetts, Alabama and Iowa rolled into one. She has great variety of climate and soil. She has a tractable and adaptive laboring population, and with good government, self reliance and the disappearance of political dissensions her future seems to be as clear and promising as her most enthusiastic son could desire."

Speaking of the pending Presidential policy, the ex-governor expressed himself in the following terms:

THE PRESIDENT'S POLICY.

"You are, of course, aware that I did not approve of the action which President Hayes took with reference to South Carolina. It was an experiment, and time alone can vindicate his judgment. I think that as a prime result he will find that the Democratic party will derive all the profit and that the Republicans in South Carolina at least will remain in a permanent minority, having little or no influence on public affairs in that State. So far as the material and financial interests are concerned, the Democratic party brings more wisdom, more experience and a more representative character to the discharge of the duties of the administration, and I can readily believe that under these conditions of General Hampton's administration the people will be satisfied. He is only doing what I could and should have done with the same influences around me, and therefore I shall heartily rejoice in his success."

THE PUBLIC DEBT.

In reply to a question concerning the public debt, Mr. Chamberlain put it at \$1,300,000 in consolidated bonds, with \$1,700,000 still to fund. He thinks the commercial honor and integrity of the public are a guarantee that interest will be paid. He denies that any of the consolidated bonds are tainted with fraud, and says a complete registry of all changes has been kept, which can be referred to at any moment.

Mr. Chamberlain concluded his interview with the following tribute to South Carolina:

"I hope you will allow me to say

further, without suggestion from yourself, that I hold to my views of events in the past as well as the present, with entire deference to those who are known to differ with me. I have the profoundest respect and admiration for the conduct and character in the main of the masses of the Republican party of South Carolina. The difficulties in the way of their success have been inherent. My connection with the colored people has inspired me not only with kind, but with respectful feelings, and I hope there is a happy and safe future before them. For the white people, notwithstanding our antagonism, I also entertain a high degree of respect. I make a large allowance for the difference of training and education, and I am willing to concede that they have acted, for the most part, in obedience to what they have regarded as the best interests of the State. I have no pride of feeling that will ever prevent me from rejoicing in any degree of peace, prosperity and harmony which may be wrought out under Democratic rule in South Carolina."
