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LEGISLATIVE PROCEEDINGS.

SATURDAY, June 2.

SENATE.

A number of bills were reported on. A motion to reconsider the appropriation bill so as to prevent any back pay going to the Mackeyites was defeated on the score that the bill had been sent to the House.

The concurrent resolution to elect a judge for the fifth circuit failed by a vote of sixteen to sixteen.

The Charleston municipal election bill passed a third reading, and was returned to the House with slight amendments.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

The House was not in session on Saturday.

MONDAY, June 4.

SENATE.

The House seed cotton bill was passed to a third reading.

A resolution to adjourn sine die on the 5th June was tabled.

Several bills and resolutions were acted upon.

At the evening session several unimportant bills were considered, and the Senate adjourned.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

The resolution requesting Judge Wright to resign was discussed. A motion to make public the testimony failed by a vote of sixteen to fifty-four.

A motion was made to make the question the special order for tomorrow night, upon which the yeas and nays were demanded, which resulted as follows: Yeas fifty two nays eighteen.

A resolution was introduced to ask the Senate to enter into an election for judge of the fifth circuit, amended on motion of Miller (Rep.) so as to include the judge of the eighth circuit, and passed. This will renew the question in the Senate.

Mr. Miller presented the papers of contest in the case of Straker vs. Dibble.

Mr. Sheppard objected to reception on the ground that the House had adjudged Straker in contempt, and could not, therefore, communicate with him. The papers were rejected by a vote of yeas twenty eight; nays forty.

The House adjourned until Tuesday, at 11 o'clock, a. m.

TUESDAY, June 5, 1877.

SENATE.

House resolution to raise a commission to investigate the indebtedness of the State was taken up. The pending question was on striking out the resolving clause.

The vote on striking out the resolving clause stood; Yeas 2—H. J. Maxwell and Taft; nays 30.

The resolution was then passed to a third reading.

A number of bills were passed to a third reading.

The Senate committee of free conference on the appropriation bill submitted majority and minority reports, both of which were made special order for 12 m. on Wednesday.

Adjourned.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

Speaker Wallace refused to allow Straker's protest against Dibble's seat, to be spread on the journal.

The following bill from the Senate provoked a long discussion. Bill to regulate and fix the per diem and mileage of members, clerks, attaches and laborers of the General Assembly and of paying the same.

The question was as to the adoption of the Senate amendment which was as follows: To give the House \$600 and mileage of 90 cents for both of the sessions, except the Mackeyites, who were to receive \$200 and mileage.

After a lengthy debate, the vote being taken upon the Senate amendments, the House refused to concur in the same, and the bill, together with the amendments, was returned to the Senate.

At the night session of the House the report of the conference com-

mittee on the appropriation bill was received. The following is the substance of the report: That section four be so amended as to appropriate \$100,000, exclusive of poll tax, for public schools, and that seven mills be the amount of the general levy, for the following purposes: 1. For current expenses. 2. For January and July interest on consolidated bonds and stock which shall be found valid by the commission and approved by the Legislature at its next session. 3. For such other indebtedness as said commission shall report to be valid, and which may be approved at the next session; and should the proceeds of the tax be insufficient, the government is authorized to borrow \$100,000.

After considerable discussion the report was made the special order for Wednesday at 11 a. m.

No other business of general interest was transacted.
