THE BEAST AT BAY.

BEN BUTLER SHOWS HIS TEETH AND GROWLS.

How He Thinks Hayes Regards Him--The Great Spoon Manipulator's Ideas of the New Whig Party.

A recent Washington telegram says: A party of citizens of the District called on B. F. Butler last evening, to secure his influence with the administration in the appointment of a commissioner for the District. To their request Butler, with much bitterness, said: "I have no favors to ask of Mr. Hayes, and consequently you have come to the wrong man. It is true I am a property holder, tax-payer, and, at times a resident here, and am interested in the welfare of the District of Columbia, but my right to speak in your behalf as a citizen is swallowed up in my being a member of Congress. Besides, gentlemen," laughingly, "you have seen in the papers that I am fighting the administration, or that I am opposed to Mr. Hayes, or something of that kind, and the papers never lie. The President knows what he is about, and is bringing about a state of affairs that was never dreamed of before. He told us in his inaugural address the great things he intended to do, and you know, gentlemen, that he is doing them. Every day he is pacifying the people. If, as you complain, the gentlemen who have visited the White House in behalf of your candidate have not been able to secure an audience with the President, why not refer his claims to W. W. Corcoran, or to General Gordon, or to men of that way of thinking? They can get an audience. I hope Mr. Hayes' policy will succeed. He is a fair seeing, able statesman, a man of great breadth of intellect and wonderful scope of power. The Republican party went into the State of Ohio, and took therefrom its greatest statesman, and elevated him to the Presidency. He is revolutionizing things in his wonderfully quiet way, and Mr. Corcoran and General Gordon are helping him. The people will be crowding each other at the polls at the next Presidential election, in order to get a chance to vote the Republican ticket. So great will be the rush that I fear many of them will be trampled to death. No more money will be used in conducting campaigns. It will all be done without it. In my last canvass I subscribed for the music, the torches the transparencies and the uniforms. I am glad to know that hereafter it is to cost nothing. It is a new way of doing things. It's wonderful! We see it in the papers that the Republican party is disbanded, that the Democratic party is dead, and that the great Whig party is to be revived. Now, gentlemen, if you want your friends to succeed, why not visit some grave-yard, and get the names of a few old respectable Whigs from the grave-stones, and put them on your friend's application. That would perhaps have great weight with the administration. I would be willing to serve you gentlemen of the District, but am afraid my advocacy of your friend would do more harm than good. Besides, Mr. Hayes says when he wants us members of Congress he will call for us, and as he has not called me I presume he doesn't want me."

Some time since, Butler wrote a sarcastic letter to Pitkin, marshal of Louisiana, advising him to offer himself as a sacrifice to Hayes' policy, and indulging in severe strictures against Wayne McVeagh, one of the commissioners to Louisiana. McVeagh returned in a sharp letter which every one expected to demolish the Beast. But Butler came up smiling and slung a whole ocean of mud over his opponent. The following is a specimen sentence. When it is remembered that McVeagh is a son-in-law of the old millionaire Senator, Simon Cameron, the force of the paragraph will be

appreciated. Here it is: "Every one has his own tastes in choosing his way to acquire money, but if I were obliged to choose one of two ways, either to 'appropriate it as a military commander,' or to marry into a family where I was neither wanted nor by which I should be respected, to get 'money to spare,' I certainly should choose the former, strange as you may think it, because at least I should have the money after having committed a disreputable act to get it, and would not be liable to be disappointed, as I might be, after I had waited long for 'dead men's shoes,' by the other method."

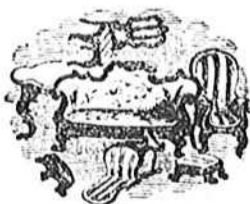
