Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of South Carolina, now met and sitting in General Assembly, and by the authority of the same :

Section 1. That Sections 55 and 56, Chapter CXX, of the Revised Statutes, relative to liens on crops, and all amendments thereto, are thereby repealed on and after the

-1st of January, 1878.
SECTION 2. That all acts and parts of acts inconsistent with this act are

hereby repealed. Approved June 8, 1877. TER XXXIX OF THE GENERAL STATUTES, RELATING TO THE POWER IN SCHOOL DISTRICTS TO LEVY AND COLLECT SPE-CIAL TAXES FOR SCHOOL PURPOSES.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of South Carolina, now met and sitting in General Assembly, and by the authority of the same:
