NEWS OF THE DAY.

Cotton in Tennessee is reported promising.
Eleven hundred Pennsylvania miners are on a strike.
Locusts have destroyed an area of a hundred miles in Tripoli.
James Russell Lowell has accepted the the mission to Spain.
Both parties in Ohio will demand the reorganization of silver.
The Alabama Radicals refuse to compromise over the Federal offices.
Senator Ferry, of Michigan, has been desperately ill, but is now out of danger.
The Western Union Telegraph company will clear \$650,000 during the present quarter.
Sir Henry Halford will organize a British team to contest with the New York rifle team.
Clarence W. Fox and John A. Simpkins are applicants for admission to West Point from South Carolina.
A young lady in Poughkeepsie has recovered eight hundred dollars damages from a fellow who jilted her twice.
The twenty-second annual convention of the Young Men's Christian Association was held last week at Louisville, Ky.
It is ascertained that about ten millions of dollars worth of fractional currency have disappeared through mutilation, etc.
President Lerdo is making active preparations, by the aid of General Escobedo, to regain the Presidency from which he was expelled by Diaz.
The New York Legislature passed a law against pool-players, and the pools were immediately set up in Jersey City. And now Jersey has run them away.
Col. Jack Wharton, an ex-Confederate who followed Longstreet's lead in turning Republican, has been appointed United States marshal of Louisiana. Pitkin, the present marshal, is much disgusted, as he "fixed" the Returning Board for Hayes.
Attorney-General Devens has written a sharp letter to District Judge Dick, of North Carolina, desiring to know how fraudulent papers pass through his court. This is supposed to refer to vouchers in blank, to which the clerk of his court, it is alleged, certified affidavits. A deputy marshal named Franks has been arrested for fraud, and he implicates Marshal Douglass. Douglass is angry, and demands investigation.
The course of justice in the case of the Chico, California, murderers was laudably rapid. On the 14th of March a party of white men, members of an association formed for the purpose of preventing Chinese immigration, took arms and kerosene to a cabin occupied by Chinamen, in Butte county, robbed the occupants, shot them, set fire to the premises and left. Nine of the jurors were for murder in the first degree, but rather than bring about a disagreement yielded and made the finding murder in the second degree; and thus, forty-two days after their crime was committed, the murderers entered the State prison to serve ten year terms.

THE LAWS OF THE STATE.

AN ACT TO AMEND SECTIONS 55 AND 56, CHAPTER CXX, OF THE REVISED STATUTES, RELATIVE TO LIENS ON CROPS.
Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of South Carolina, now met and sitting in General Assembly, and by the authority of the same: SECTION 1. That Sections 55 and 56, Chapter CXX, of the Revised Statutes, relative to liens on crops, and all amendments thereto, are hereby repealed on and after the 1st of January, 1878.
SECTION 2. That all acts and parts of acts inconsistent with this act are hereby repealed.
Approved June 8, 1877.

AN ACT TO AMEND SECTION 15 OF CHAPTER XXXIX OF THE GENERAL STATUTES, RELATING TO THE POWER IN SCHOOL DISTRICTS TO LEVY AND COLLECT SPECIAL TAXES FOR SCHOOL PURPOSES.
Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of South Carolina, now met and sitting in General Assembly, and by the authority of the same: SECTION 1. That Section 15 of Chapter XXXIX of the General Statutes be, and the same is hereby amended, by striking out all of subdivision 4 of said section.
SECTION 2. All acts and parts of acts inconsistent with this act be and the same are hereby repealed.
Approved June 8, 1877.

AN ACT TO PROHIBIT THE SALE OF SEED COTTON BETWEEN THE TIME OF THE SETTING AND RISING OF THE SUN, AND TO REGULATE THE SALE OF SEED COTTON.
SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of South Carolina, now met and sitting in General Assembly, and by the authority of the same, That on and after the passage of this act, it shall not be lawful for any person to buy, or sell, or receive by way of barter, exchange or traffic of any sort, any seed cotton, between the hours of sun-down and sun rise of any day.
SECTION 2. That any person who shall violate the provisions of section 1 of this act, shall, upon conviction in the Court of General Sessions, or of a Trial Justice, be fined the sum of \$50, or imprisoned in the county jail for a period of thirty days, or both, in the discretion of the court.
SECTION 3. That all acts or parts of acts inconsistent with this act be, and the same are hereby repealed.
Approved June 8, 1877.
