We arrived rather late at the hall and found, as is invariably the case, that it was full to overflowing, the fair sex being well represented. It was with feelings of pride that we saw so many young and beautiful faces that would do credit to any place. The entertainment began with a salutatory from Master Bolick, after which was read a composition by Miss Eloise Davis. This was followed by a play in which the idea of woman's rights was predominant. NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS.

COUNTY TREASURER'S OFFICE,
WINSTBORO, S. C., June 30, 1877.

NOTICE is hereby given that the tax books of this office will be open from the second to the thirty-first of July, 1877, inclusive, for the collection of the State and county taxes for the fiscal year 1876.

The amount levied is as follows:
For State purposes - - - 7 mills.
For County purposes - - - 3 mills.

Total - - - - - 10 mills.
Poll tax, required of all able-bodied males between the ages of twenty-one and fifty years - - - - - \$1.00.

The above-stated taxes are payable in two equal instalments—one-half during the month of July and one-half during the month of October. Persons failing to pay the first instalment when due are required by law to pay interest on the same at the rate of one per cent, per month until paid.

The treasurer is authorized to receive in payment of the above-stated taxes, only the following: Gold and silver coin, United States currency, and national bank notes.

The receipts of the Special Agent will be taken as cash.
