We are requested to state that the Young Men's Christian Association will meet in the Presbyterian church on next Monday evening at 8 1/2 o'clock.

A colored man was in town the other day, from the country, complaining that he had lost over a hundred dollars this year by the incursions of stock. The remedy is a change in the fence law.

The Columbia Register announces that a movement is on foot to introduce immigrants into central and upper South Carolina this fall. If this is the case, Fairfield should have a hand in the movement.

The Columbia Convocation of the Episcopal church will meet in Chester during the latter part of the month. Richland, Fairfield, Chester, Lancaster, York, Union, Spartanburg and Greenville will be represented. Bishop Howe will be in attendance.

Col. Y. F. Pope has been unanimously nominated by the Democrats of Newberry, to fill the vacancy in the House of Representatives caused by the refusal of the House to admit Thomas. It is an admirable selection. Newberry will step in line along with Fairfield and other counties.

The Newberry papers contain highly complimentary notices of the final exhibition of Mr. R. H. Clarkson's male academy in that place. Great praise is awarded both to teacher and pupils. We are pleased to see this. Mr. Clarkson is a most conscientious and zealous instructor and he deserves success.

The Democracy of Williamsburg seems hopelessly split. The old and the new Executive Committee have called separate conventions for the 28th of July, and no prospect of a healing of the breach appears. This should be a warning to the Democrats not to bicker and quarrel.

An important change has been made in the schedule of the day train on the South Carolina Railroad. Passengers leave Columbia at 3:15 p. m. and reach Charleston that night at ten o'clock, and returning leave Charleston at 5:45, a. m., and reach Columbia at 12:15. Thus the trip consumes only six and a half hours. The night schedule is unaltered.

A number of ladies in town have requested us to write an article against the cows, and especially the bell cows that roam the streets. The bells are pronounced an insufferable nuisance, as they keep up an interminable discordant jingling fatal to the sleep or rest of the parties victimized. The town council is requested to fulminate an ordinance against bells.

We call the attention of the sheriff to the conduct of the prisoners in jail. As these are allowed the freedom of the galleries of the jail, the windows of which overlook the most public portion of town, they are constantly engaged in conversing

with passers by, and are often boisterous and even profane and obscene in their language. They should be allowed to go on the galleries only on condition of good behavior. The town cannot stand the nuisance of noisy jailbirds, and the sheriff should put a stop to it.

**Fence Law Elections.**

FOR the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of the following named townships in Fairfield county, S. C. A PROPOSITION TO ALTER THE FENCE LAW, in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the Legislature of this State, approved June 7th, 1877, it is hereby ordered that an election be held in the several townships, at the places designated below, on WEDNESDAY, THE 15TH DAY OF AUGUST next, and that the polls be kept open from 6 o'clock, a. m., until 6 o'clock, p. m., the form of the ballot to be as follows, viz: Those in favor of altering the Fence Law will use a ballot, either written or printed—"In favor of altering the Fence Law."
