A squad of the Fire Engine Company was out for practice on Thursday afternoon. This is the beginning of a plan that we trust will be systematically kept up by the Company. It is very important that the firemen should become perfectly familiarized with the working of their apparatus in all its details, and the practice thus begun will do much towards that end.

School Commissioner Richardson calls in for registration all teachers' pay certificates issued prior to October 31, 1876, and announces that payments will be made on and after the 25th inst. All persons holding claims will do well to have them properly registered. The claims will not be paid in full, as the funds on hand are sufficient to pay but two-thirds of the amount outstanding.

A colored man, Rev. Charles Ford, aged seventy-three, writes from Mt. Pleasant, Monroe county, Alabama, to know if any of his relatives are living. He is the son of Charlotte Griffin, servant of Mrs. Rachel Griffin and afterwards of Mr. John D. Griffin and was born on Dutchman's creek in this county. He moved to Alabama in 1825, leaving six brothers, Alfred, Ben, Francis, Peter Jackson and Washington, and a sister named Patsy. He wants to hear from some of these or their relatives.

QUITE A DISAPPOINTMENT.—A large number of ladies and gentlemen had assembled at the two depots on Thursday evening, intending to go to Ridgeway for the theatricals that night. The party remained in waiting till about nine o'clock, when a telegram announced that, owing to a fallen trestle, the train had come to a stop a few miles this side of Rock Hill, and would not be on until very late at night. The pleasure-seekers could therefore do nothing but return to their homes and bear their disappointment as best they could.

We are pleased to learn that, notwithstanding the absence of those who intended to go from Winnsboro, the audience in attendance upon the theatricals was very large—the building being filled almost to overflowing. The proceeds in money were also large.

It is to be hoped that when the good people of Ridgeway have another entertainment, their friends in Winnsboro will not be prevented from doing a share towards its success.

HAMPTON TAX RECEIPTS.—The Columbia Register of a recent date furnishes the subjoined information in regard to receipts given by the special agents for the ten per cent contribution, which may prove of value to some of our readers:

The receipts issued by the special agents for the collection of the ten per cent contribution on account of taxes, are made receivable for taxes the present year, and the act authorizing the same does not specify that they are only receivable from those persons who paid the contri-

bution. The receipts are made negotiable by this action of the Legislature, and any person having possession of them can tender the same in payment of taxes. Doubtless, many of these receipts are lost or mislaid by the contributors, who did not so much regard their value, as they were anxious to sustain the Hampton government, and made their contributions as a free-will offering on the altar of patriotism. In order to meet such cases, we are informed, the comptroller-general has issued instructions by which the county treasurers will be required to make a memorandum of all persons so claiming to have mislaid their receipts, and which will ultimately secure the proper parties a credit for the amount paid. This arrangement will serve as a check upon improper persons receiving credit therefor. The books of the special agents are in the hands of the comptroller-general, and the memorandum list (when received from a county treasurer) will be compared with the original entry, so that every person will receive the full benefit of his patriotic action. We make this statement because it had come to our knowledge that taxpayers in some counties are perplexed about the loss of receipts.

Fence Law Elections.

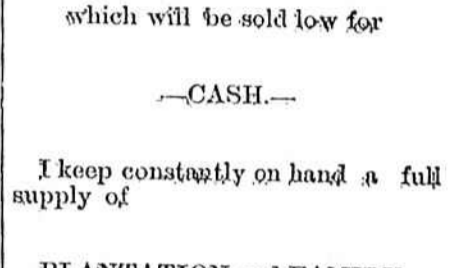
