The Methodist Conference.

The regular District Conference of the Methodist Church South, for Columbia District, was begun at the Methodist church on Wednesday night. The opening sermon was delivered by Rev. Jno. T. Wightman. The Conference assembled on Thursday morning for the transaction of business, Rev. E. J. Meynardie, D. D., presiding. Mr. J. A. Elkin was chosen secretary, and Rev. W. W. Williams assistant secretary. The different churches were largely represented. A full list of the delegates will appear hereafter.

The entire morning session was taken up with the reports from the several charges. These reports were all encouraging, and show the church to be in a flourishing and growing condition.

Services were held on Thursday night, Rev. R. W. Barber preaching.

On Friday morning, the Conference meeting at 9 o'clock, the reading of reports from the charges was taken up and continued till 11½ o'clock, the hour appointed for divine service. The sermon on this occasion was delivered by Rev. Saml. Leard.

The Conference met at 4, p. m., and remained in session till 6, p. m. Reports were read from several of the charges.

On Friday night the usual services were held, the sermon being preached by Rev. J. Walter Dickson.

The appointments for to-morrow are published elsewhere.

Base-Ball.

The second game of base ball in the match between the Nameless and Chicoras took place in Winnsboro on Wednesday afternoon, and attracted a large crowd. Business was dull, and the clerks generally shut up store and repaired to the College green with everybody else.

The game was called at 4, p. m., Mr. H. B. McMaster being umpire, and Messrs. E. S. Chandler and A. Y. Milling scorers for the respective clubs.

FIRST INNING.—The Nameless went to the bat, and Elliott, Beaty and Crawford scored. Huey, Jordan and Gooding out. Chicoras then went in, O. Dantzer to the bat. He went out. H. Rabb scored. Gibson and C. Rabb went out, leaving W. Rabb on 2d base. Huey made two magnificent foul-fly catches, and was applauded. This began to make things lively.

SECOND INNING.—Nameless. Boylston made a base. Ketchin made his base on three strikes and a bad throw, which brought in Boylston. Crows runs for 1st base on three strikes, but is put out, and by a fine double play to second, Ketchin is also retired. Elliott takes the side out. Chicoras. Lemmon takes 1st base on three balls. E. Rabb goes out on three strikes, O. Dantzer meanwhile tallying by a muff by catcher. M. Dantzer goes out on 1st base, and Scruggs takes side out on a foul caught by catcher. Score, 4 to 2.

THIRD INNING.—Nameless. Huey takes 1st base and makes 3d by a muff by catcher. Crawford retires on three strikes. Jordan goes out, but Huey tallies. Gooding makes 1st base by muffed fly by 2d base, takes second and makes home by ball passing 3d base. Boylston makes 2d by passed ball, and Ketchin 1st by missed fly. Crows strikes a fly caught by Gibson, s. s., who puts it to second before Ketchin, but three are already out and the side retires with three scores. Chicoras. O. Dantzer to the bat, out on first by pitcher. H. Rabb out on first by short stop. Gibson out on foul by catcher. This is the first goose egg, and excitement runs high. Considerable betting had been going on, but the Nameless are the favorites. Score, 7 to 2.

FOURTH INNING.—Nameless. Elliott takes 1st base on three strikes and a bad throw by catcher. Huey takes the bat while Elliott makes third base and home by passed ball. Judgment called, but decided in favor of the runner. Beaty goes out on a fine throw from short stop to 1st base. Crawford makes first by muffed fly. Jordan practices with several heavy fouls and then sends a heavy fly muffed by left field, which brings in Crawford and himself amid applause. Gooding goes out on foul fly by catcher, and Boylston follows and puts side out, after four tallies. Chicoras. The Chicoras now put in some fine playing. W. Rabb goes out by pitcher. C. Rabb makes two bases in a miss by 1st base. Lemmon makes first and takes second. E. Rabb tips a foul which disables catcher, and time is called, but Huey resumes play after a few moments. O. Dantzer makes home by a passed ball. E. Rabb sends a daisy-entter to right field, and makes home by missed balls. M. Dantzer and Scruggs each make first by fly to right field. O. Dantzer sends a crusher to left field and his chances seem good for several bases, but Crows nips his hopes by a splendid side catch away over on left field. H. Rabb follows with a crowder over centrefield, takes two bases and brings in M. Dantzer and Scruggs. Gibson takes side out on a fly, leaving H. Rabb on 2nd base. The Chicoras feel better they have scored five runs; and the game stands 11 to 7.

FIFTH INNING.—The Nameless, however, have got their mettle up and go in for a heavy score. Ketchin strikes a foul and Chicoras catcher and 1st base collide—the latter receiving a severe shock, but after a little time coming up smilingly. At this point the ground is cleared of outsiders who had pressed in. One spectator claims the immunities of the press as a reporter of the *Union-Herald*, but is compelled to retire after a vain appeal. The game proceeds. Ketchin goes out on a foul. Crows makes 1st base by a bad muff, and makes home by missed throws. Elliott sends a crushing daisy entter to left field. Huey made the hit of his life over to centre field, reaching 3d base and bringing Elliott in. Beaty and Jordan make splendid hits. Boylston retires on a fly by right field, and the Chicoras do splendid throwing and catching around the diamond—but too late. Ketchin bats heavily, and Crows sends a crusher away down centre field, bringing in Ketchin and Gooding and reaching home without a stop—just grazing a home run. Elliott bats heavily again. Huey takes base on muffed fly, steals bases but goes out on home by catcher. Ten tallies are scored. The Chicoras came pluckily to the bat, but fortune is against them, and another 0 is scored against them, the game standing 21 to 7.

SIXTH INNING.—Gibson relieves M. Dantzer as catcher. Beaty, Jordan, and Gooding make good hits; a fly from the latter is muffed by left field and second base, who collide. Boylston goes out. The game continues with varying success. The wind blows strongly against the batter, and it grows dark and cloudy. The side goes out after scoring eight runs

The Chicoras go to the bat, but interest in the game has flagged and it is evident that the entire game cannot be played. The spectators begin to leave for fear of rain. The Chicoras score one run, making the game stand 29 to 8.

The seventh inning began, but before proceeding to any length, the umpire called the game, at five minutes to seven o'clock.

The game was very interesting throughout. The clubs are both good, and the players are well up in the game. We shall expect fine sport again, though the exact date of the third game is not announced. The Nameless go to Columbia on Monday to play again there.
