The Methodist Conference.

The Conference met on Saturday morning, and proceeded to a discussion of the subject of Christian Education. Addresses were delivered by Rev. Jno. T. Wightman, president of the board of trustees of the Columbia Female College, by Rev. J. Walter Dickson, a professor in the same institution, and by Rev. W. W. Duncan, a member of the faculty of Wofford College. These addresses were all able and interesting, and commanded an attentive hearing from those present.

The services at night were conducted by Rev. J. W. Kelly, who likewise delivered the sermon.

The services on Sunday morning were introduced with a Love Feast at the Methodist Church, at 9 o'clock, Rev. A. B. Brown presiding. The different pulpits were filled by members of the Conference—Rev. W. W. Duncan preaching at the Methodist church, Rev. Samuel Leard at the Presbyterian church, and Rev. J. T. Clyde at the Associate Reformed Presbyterian church. In the afternoon there was a Sunday School Mass Meeting, conducted by Dr. Meynardie. Addresses were delivered by Master Charles Meynardie, Mr. J. A. Elkin, Rev. Samuel Leard and Rev. W. W. Duncan. The singing of the children was peculiarly fine. At six o'clock there was the customary meeting of the Young Men's Christian Association. Mr. J. A. Elkin conducted the services, and addresses were delivered by him and by Dr. Meynardie. The usual services were held at night at the Methodist church, Rev. J. E. Carlisle conducting the service and preaching the sermon. Before the benediction was pronounced, Dr. Meynardie, as Presiding Elder, expressed in feeling terms the gratitude of the members of the Conference for the hospitality extended to them by the citizens of Winnsboro and vicinity, and bade an affectionate farewell to his brethren of the Conference and to the people with

whom they had been thrown in pleasant communion.

Altogether, the session of the Conference in our midst was a source of much gratification to our people, and we trust it was not unattended with good results to all. The services throughout were interesting in a high degree—a fact of which there can be no better evidence than is found in the full attendance upon all the meetings. Several times was the Methodist church crowded to overflowing, and always were the congregations attentive, interested and appreciative. We trust that it will not be very long before our community may again have the privilege of entertaining the members of the District Conference and of attending upon its sessions.

It affords us pleasure to comply with the request of the Conference to publish in THE NEWS AND HERALD the following resolutions, unanimously adopted by the body:—

Resolved—1. That the thanks of this District Conference be returned to the citizens of Winnsboro and vicinity, for their kindness and hospitality in receiving the members of this Conference into their homes and entertaining them during their stay in this community.
