Township Meeting.

The Democratic Club of Township No. 4 met in the Town Hall Tuesday evening the 21st inst., and was called to order by F. Gerig, President, who stated that the Club had been convened in obedience to a circular from the County Chairman, General Bratton. The resignation of J. W. Law as a representative from the Club on the County Executive Committee was accepted, and an election entered into to fill the vacancy. John J. Neil, Esq., having received a majority of the votes cast, was declared duly elected to fill the vacancy.

Col. J. H. Rion offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That while we deprecate the manner in which the nomination for the office of Clerk was made at the late County Convention, we deem it the duty of all the Democrats of Fairfield, and of the members of this Club, to abide by and support the nominations made by that Convention.

The resolution was seconded by Mr. J. H. Cummings. After some discussion Mr. Reynolds offered the following as a substitute for Colonel Rion's resolution:

Resolved, That we hereby ratify and endorse the nominations made by the Democratic County Club on the 14th July last, and pledge ourselves to do all in our power to further the success of the Democratic cause.

Resolved, That we call upon all true Democrats in Fairfield to unite in the effort to bring about a Democratic success in the ensuing contest.

The substitute was seconded by Mr. T. R. Robertson, and further discussion ensued. A vote by yeas and nays being demanded, the roll was called, and resulted as follows: yeas 39, nays 13.

Mr. J. H. Cummings offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That we deprecate the manner in which the nomination for Clerk was made at the late County Convention.

The vote, being called for by yeas and nays, on the adoption of the resolution, stood as follows: yeas 16, nays 35. The resolution was thereupon declared lost.

The point of order was raised by Mr. Cummings, that all participating in the meeting were bound by its action, and pending discussion the reading of the Eighth Article was called for and it was read by the Secretary, as follows:

The members of this Club pledge themselves to each other and to the Democratic party to abide by and

sustain the nominees of the party for all offices, whether National, State or County, and will discountenance every effort on the part of individuals to distract our counsels and divide the vote upon independent candidates, whom we will regard hereafter as giving aid and comfort to our political opponents.

The following members tendered their resignations, which were accepted: H. B. McMaster, A. P. Miller, R. F. Leetch, Charles Stuart, R. J. McCarley, W. H. Williams, S. W. Ruff and J. H. Lybrand.

The Club then adjourned.

EXECUTIVE CHAMBER.
COLUMBIA, AUGUST 21, 1877.

To the Commissioners and Managers of Election for Fairfield County:

WHEREAS vacancies exist in the office of Clerk of the Court of Common Pleas and General Sessions, and of three County Commissioners for the County of Fairfield, by reason of the failure of the respective officers elected thereto, to qualify within the time prescribed by law:

NOW, THEREFORE, you and each of you, are hereby required, with strict regard to the provisions of the Constitution and laws of the State, touching your duty in such case, to cause an election to be held in the said county on TUESDAY THE 4th DAY OF SEPTEMBER next, to fill said vacancies. All bar rooms and drinking saloons in said county will be closed on said day of election, and any person who shall sell any intoxicating drink in said county on that day shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof shall be fined in a sum not less than one hundred dollars, or be imprisoned for a period of not less than one month nor more than six months.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand, and caused the Great Seal of the State to be affixed, at Columbia, the 21st day of August, A. D. 1877, and in the one hundred and second year of American Independence.

ON and after this date, 11th instant, until the 31st of August proximo, this office will be opened for returns of all taxable property, as required by law, for the fiscal year 1877.

All persons between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years are liable to a roll tax, and must make returns accordingly. After the 31st of August proximo, a penalty of fifty per cent. will be added to the taxable property of all persons failing to make returns within the prescribed time.
