Slightly Familiar With Wales.

Those who remember how Major Tom Ochiltree was appointed United States Marshal for the State of Texas—pursuing President Grant that he, Major Tom, was seriously injured in the defense of the President's good name against a crowd of Texas ruffians—will not be prejudiced against the truth of this other story anent him as told by a New Mexico newspaper: "On one occasion he was in England, a guest of a nobleman who had come in contact with him during a visit to this country, and who had fallen an easy victim to Tom's unsurpassed impudence and powers of fascination. The Englishman had taken Tom to London and was exhibiting him to his friends as a genuine American lion. Tom was plentifully supplied with funds by his noble friend, and was cutting a grand figure. One day Tom and his friend met the Prince of Wales at a club. The nobleman asked permission of the Prince to introduce his American friend. Leave having been obtained, Tom was formally introduced to the heir apparent. He grasped the royal hand and shook it heartily, and then burst out: 'Wales, old fellow, I'm devilish glad to know you; let's take a drink!' The horror of the nobleman was changed to amazement when the Prince gave Tom's hand a hearty shake and replied, 'Don't care if I do.' Check carried the day."

NEWS OF THE DAY.

A method of burning petroleum under steam boilers has been successful in Italy. It consists simply in throwing it over a thin layer of asbestos, which, being incombustible, serves to retain the oil, and provide a large wick. Sheets of paper placed beneath the furnace were not injured by the intense heat.

The first of a series of suits against the striking silk weavers at Paterson, New Jersey, has been decided against them. The actions are to recover damages for not fulfilling contracts to finish warps. Twenty-six more cases are pending. It might be well to change the maxim to: "Look before you strike."

A big telescope is being made at Cambridge for Yale. It will cost \$50,000, \$6,000 having already been paid for the flint with which to make the object glass. A nine-inch telescope, costing \$5,000, is also being made at the same works for Princeton College, and a \$6,000 eleven-inch instrument, fifteen feet long, for the government observatory at Lisbon, Portugal.

General Field, of Fredericksburg, Va., has recently returned home from Egypt, where he held a high position in the army of the Khedive. His withdrawal from that army grew out of the Turko-Russian complications, in which Egypt, through her vassalage to the Sultan, has been forced to take part. The American officer could not conscientiously take the field for the Crescent against the Cross, and so resigned. In fact, it is stated that about all the American officers in the Khedive's service have been gotten rid of in one way or another.

The dead body of a Dr. Winslow has been cremated at Salt Lake City. It weighed a first one hundred and twenty-six pounds. The first appearance was that of roasting; but in twenty minutes nearly all the flesh was consumed, and the bones began to crumble. A half hour later very little could be seen of the form of the body. One hour later a physician opened the door of the furnace, and but one or two pieces of bone could be seen, and they crumbled under the weight of the ashes. The incineration was completed in the shortest time on record—two hours and thirty-five minutes. The weight of the ashes, which contained a few calcined fragments of bone, was four pounds and eleven and a half ounces.

Mr. Smith, of McDuffie county, Ga., has been working for some time, with profit, a gold mine on

his place in that county. He has only two or three colored miners to assist him, and yet he sends nearly every month to Augusta a nugget of pure gold worth from six hundred to eight hundred dollars. His expenses hardly exceed one hundred dollars per month. Last June he forwarded a nugget worth \$799.

THE FEDERAL troops are still kept in Pennsylvania, at the solicitation of Governor Hartranft, to guard the State against any disturbance of the peace by coal miners, iron workers, or railroad men. Hartranft is anxious to have the State fully and permanently garrisoned by the Federal government. He cannot trust the militia with the preservation of order and the maintenance of peace.
