NEWS OF THE DAY.

Mr. Cavill swam across the English Channel last week in twelve hours.

The experiment of steam has been successfully tried on one of the city railroads in Brooklyn.

Moody thinks that he will preach in small New England towns rather than in large Western cities.

New York will enjoy the distinction of having a colored cadet at West Point. Where is Boston, with all her love for the man and brother?

Two teams of Indians have come down from Canada to Newport, to play "lacrosse," an old Indian game full of interest and excitement.

Senator Blaine, after bitterly attacking the President, had the check to invite him to his house as a guest last week. Hayes didn't see the honor.

The miners of Pennsylvania are still turbulent, and danger is not entirely past, as they number sixty thousand persons.

There has been a battle fought in Abyssinia, in which King John has conquered all who opposed him. He is now firmly established on his throne.

A man named Harding, while exhibiting a wire fire escape, fell from a fourth story window of the Astor House, New York, last week, and was instantly killed.

The Central Vermont Railroad has abandoned fifty-eight miles of track between Bennington and Chatham, on the ground that it doesn't pay expenses. A unique idea.

The Pennsylvania Democrats have nominated Noyes for treasurer, and have passed appropriate resolutions, denouncing Hayes' election, but approving his policy.

As President MacMahon was leaving Cherbourg, on Sunday before last a Republican demonstration occurred. He was greeted with shouts of "vive la Republique! Vive Thiers!" and the singing of the "Marseillaise."

Gen. Howard is making poor progress against the Indians. He is still pursuing them, but when he gets near them, they kill his skirmishers, steal his horses and make off. Howard is a great fraud.

Two tramps fought each other recently over the question whether the better meal was to be begged in Boston or New Orleans. The Boston man killed the other, and beans and brains are ahead.

The officers of the British army or navy, who are also in the service of the Khedive, have been allowed by the British government to remain in their present position so long as they are not engaged in any warlike purpose.

A Spanish deputy, named Salamanca, has created great excitement in Madrid by charging the government with gross mismanagement, and asserting that one vigorous, earnest campaign would long since have subdued the rebels. He was silenced after speaking several hours and asking many hard questions.

Postmaster General Key accompanied Hayes on his New England tour, and made a fool of himself. He alluded to the people of the South as "erring brethren," and quoted the lines beginning, "While the lamp holds out to burn."

The Khedive will resist the attempt of any foreign power to control the Suez Canal. His Highness is reported to have said that the canal would be of but doubtful use to commerce should it cease to belong to Egypt, for then it might be used by one nation as a means of destroying the commerce of another. But as long as it remains in Egyptian hands, it will remain open to all trading vessels, of any nationality whatever.

The Western Union and the Atlantic and Pacific telegraph companies have virtually consolidated, all receipts being pooled, in the proportion of one to seven—that is, the Western Union to retain 87 1/2 per

cent., and the Atlantic and Pacific 12 1/2 per cent of the joint earnings. The rates will not be materially increased. During the past six months it is said the two companies earned \$10,500,000, and it is claimed the Western Union will be able to pay at the rate of eight to ten per cent. dividend, and the Atlantic and Pacific four per cent. per annum.
