The Chester and Union Narrow Gauge Railroad.

We learn that the preliminary survey for the proposed Chester and Union Narrow Gauge Railroad has been completed. A report with estimates was submitted to the incorporators of the road at the grand barbecue and meeting which took place on the 25th, at Lockhart's Shoals, on Broad river. About one thousand people were there assembled, to discuss the prospects of the road and to devise ways and means for building it. Judge Mackey made one of his happiest speeches, giving a full statement of the many advantages of the narrow gauge system, and its perfect adaptability to the wants of our people. He demonstrated conclusively that, by adopting the three feet gauge for all cross lines, and by using convict labor in building them, a railroad may be easily constructed by any community that really needs it. Short and very effective addresses were delivered by Major R. W. Shand of Union, Dr. A. H. Dayega, and W. H. Hardin of Chester. About \$15,000 was subscribed at once, and such pledges were given as insure the amount necessary to secure the charter and the speedy construction of the road. The survey was made by Capt. C. S. Dwight, Chief Engineer of the Chester & Ijenoir Railroad.

Why cannot Fairfield have built through her territory the proposed narrow gauge railroad from Chester to Georgetown, via Camden and Sumter? Let our people keep the matter in mind. Fairfield must act, and that soon, if she would keep her ancient rank amongst her sister counties.

EXECUTIVE CHAMBER,
COLUMBIA AUGUST 21, 1877.

To the Commissioners and Managers of Election for Fairfield County:

WHEREAS vacancies exist in the office of Clerk of the Court of Common Pleas and General Sessions, and of three County Commissioners for the County of Fairfield, by reason of the failure of the respective officers elected thereto, to qualify within the time prescribed by law:

NOW, THEREFORE, you and each of you, are hereby required, with strict regard to the provisions of the Constitution and laws of the State, touching your duty in such case, to cause an election to be held in said county on TUESDAY THE 4th DAY OF SEPTEMBER next, to fill said vacancies. All bar rooms and drinking saloons in said county will be closed on said day of election, and any person who shall sell any intoxicating drink in said county on that day shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof, shall be fined in a sum not less than ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS, or be imprisoned for a period of not less than one month nor more than six months.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand, and caused the Great Seal of the State to be affixed, at Columbia, the 21st day of August, A. D. 1877, and in the one hundred and second year of American Independence.
