The Star of Bucharest.

A correspondent writes as follows from Russian headquarters:

One year ago I was strongly for even the weak excitements of the nightly amusements of Bucharest—which, by the way, are as harmless as they are primitive. But Rashga's Garden, with its French *chansonette* singers and passable music, seems like a Paradise in memory when one is compelled to linger the evening through in captivity here. One wonders if the enchanting Rachel is still queen of the Garden, as of gay Bucharest; if she still sits there and, applauding her former companions, laughs with her charming child-laughter and controls the applause of the entire audience as she will! One wonders if she is still the flattered of princes who swarm around her whenever she is seen; and if the Great Prince deigns, now and then, to stop and chat with the little winsome doll that captivates all hearts. You wonder who is Rachel—pronounce Rachel if you please, it sounds better. She is by birth a Bordelaise, her mother was French, her father an American. And Rachel has inherited from the one her gaiety and sparkling wit, from the other her intellect and her bright, charming ways that make her the idol of princes.

In ago perhaps eighteen or nineteen, a baby-woman indeed, wilful and entertaining, in experience a woman, and with a future before her that might turn giddy a less balanced head. When Rachel is indisposed generals and princes send her bouquets and flowers, until her apartments resemble a winter garden, and anxious messages are sent by high dignitaries with the hope that she may soon be recovered and make Bucharest gay again. She is betrothed to a young Russian officer, whom she loves, and in whose great deeds she justly glories; for he is very brave, though I will not reveal his name. She is generous, and she compels others to be generous where she thinks it worth her while. Not long ago there was a grand garden concert at Rashga's, for the benefit of the Red Cross. The Princess of Roumania was there; and Rachel was there too. There was a kind of lottery, and she played for her admirers. She compelled Prince * * * to give her a napoleon to cast in the lottery, then other princes innumerable and with and without blood, had to follow suit, until over fifty napoleons were added to the Red Cross fund, and the charming girl carried off as her prizes a heap of little knick-knacks, laughing with child-like glee at her triumph.

King's Mountain Military School.

Before the late war, almost every State in the South had a State Military Academy, while there were, besides those, a number of private military schools. We are glad to see that in all the Southern States military institutions are being re-established. In our judgment, they train our youth for the battle of life more effectively than any other method of education. They teach self control, obedience, system, punctuality, and responsibility. For fine scholarship and literary attainments, our civil colleges and universities doubtless are superior. But few now aspire to attain such excellencies. Our condition of poverty and struggle for the necessities of life does not warrant it, and such are the rare exceptions. The great body of the youth, to whom the future here belongs, aim to be practical men of conduct. And in military schools they find the best education for their purposes, and for the state of the country.

We make these remarks in commending to public attention the only military school in South Carolina, that of Colonel Coward, at Yorkville. This accomplished gentleman has the respect and confidence of all who know him. His record is unimpeachable. He was the partner in teaching of the lamented Jenkins. The school building and grounds are excellent, and situated in a beautiful and healthful climate. The instructions, we have understood, are thorough, and

the care of the boys is admirable. We therefore take particular pleasure in noticing this Institution.—*Charleston Journal of Commerce.*
