POLITICS IN CHURCH.—We are informed that on the Sunday before the recent election, the Reverend Felix Torrence, now in charge of the colored Methodist church here, announced the election from the pulpit. Now this is mixing things very badly indeed. This "follower of the Lamb" has no business to make his pulpit the means of getting lukewarm negroes up to the scratch in politics. THE PAY OF AUDITORS.—Comptroller General Hagood recently sent the following circular to the county treasurer:

To Jas. Q. Davis, Treasurer Fairfield County:
DEAR SIR—The act of June 7th, 1877, No. 235, provides that the expenses of assessment (not to exceed in your county \$400) shall be paid to your auditor on the check of the county commissioners, by the county treasurer, "out of the first collections of county funds of the fiscal year in which the work shall be performed."

The assessment now being made is in the fiscal year 1876, and the

collection of taxes now being made is of and for the fiscal year 1876. You will, out of these collections, pay the expenses of this year's assessment, now being made, and of none other.

A similar circular has been sent to each of the treasurers throughout the State. The auditors did not draw their pay, for making the last assessment, out of the funds collected last year, as the law requires. The funds now being collected are applicable only to the pay of the present auditor, and as no two assessments can be made or paid for in the same year, the different ex-auditors are not provided for. We understand that in two cases made in two different counties in Judge Shaw's circuit, the views of the comptroller-general have been sustained. The old auditors are therefore dependent for their pay upon a special Legislative appropriation in their behalf.
