We are requested to state that the Colored Baptist Association will meet in Winnsboro on the 25th instant, at St. Paul's church.

Nicey Stark, a colored woman living on Maj. T. W. Woodard's plantation, dropped dead on the 15th inst.

The regular Quarterly Conference of the M. E. Church will be held in this place on Sunday next. Rev. W. W. Duncan of Wofford College will preach.

It is said that the reason there was no bill found in the case of Prince Martin for bigamy, is that Sallie Gibson, the colored woman who made affidavit several months ago that she saw the first wedding, swore before the grand jury that she hadn't seen it. A change came over the spirit of her dream.

Mr. R. C. Fleming, Superintendent Port Royal Railroad, writes as follows to Mr. J. F. McMaster:

Yours of the 12th, containing \$26.50 for the sick at Port Royal, came duly to hand, and I now return in the name of the sick thanks for this donation as well as the box of sundries. I am glad to say, the sick are all improving now, and I hope soon may all be well.

On Monday afternoon, two colored men, John Moore and Solomon Johnson, had a fight on Mr. Samuel Cathcart's place. Johnson shot Moore in the abdomen, and then fled. It is claimed that Moore, who is the larger of the two, had been threatening Johnson, and the latter procured a pistol. Hearing this, Moore sought Johnson, and dared him to shoot. The latter making no demonstration, Moore attacked him, when Johnson shot. It is not known yet whether the wound will be fatal.

THE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.—The Association of the Baptist Church, composing portions of the counties of Richland, Fairfield and Chester, met at Sandy Level Church, near Blythewood, on Friday, the 12th inst. The attendance was very full, numbering among others the Revs. W. A. Gaines, T. W. Smith, T. W. Mellichamp, R. W. Sanders, A. W. Lamar, B. F. Corley, and J. D. Mahon. About sixty lay delegates were present. Dr. S. W. Bookhart presided as Moderator, and Dr. John Boyd was appointed Clerk. The usual routine business was transacted. The Rev. Mr. Sanders preached the opening sermon, and the Rev. T. W. Smith the sermon on Charities. The Association adjourned on Sunday after a most gratifying session.

THE ENTERTAINMENT.—Remember that the ladies will to-day give a dinner at the Thaspien Hall, for the benefit of Mount Zion College. This evening there will be a grand dramatic entertainment for the same purpose, at which a varied and well selected programme will be performed. THE CIRCUIT COURT.—Since our last report, the following business has been transacted in the circuit court:

State vs. August Vallmer, indicted for malicious mischief—A. M. Mackey for defendant. Verdict—Not guilty, under instruction of his Honor the presiding judge.

State vs. Frank Belton, indicted for malicious mischief—Jno. S. Reynolds for defendant. Verdict—Guilty. A motion for a new trial was made by the defendant's counsel, and, after argument, overruled by his Honor.

State vs. John Lathon, indicted for rape—A. M. Mackey for defendant. Verdict—Not guilty.

This was the last criminal case tried.

In the case of Prince Martin, indicted for bigamy, the grand jury returned no bill.

The grand jury made their presentment, and were discharged. The presentment contains nothing of special interest.

On Wednesday morning the prisoners convicted during the term were called into court and sentenced as follows:

Jesse Richardson, convicted of grand larceny—six months at hard labor in the penitentiary.

Wesley Lyles, convicted of assault and battery—forty days in the county jail.

Hamp Miller, convicted of malicious mischief—six months at hard labor in the penitentiary.

Frank Belton [a brother of the noted Joe Belton] convicted of malicious mischief—six months at hard labor in the penitentiary.

The Court of General Sessions was then adjourned, and the Court of Common Pleas duly opened. Several judgments by default were taken.

The following cases were then tried before the jury:

John C. Rabb vs. John A. Brico & Co., complaint for money due for services rendered—A. M. Mackey for plaintiff, F. J. Cameron for defendant. Verdict for the defendant.

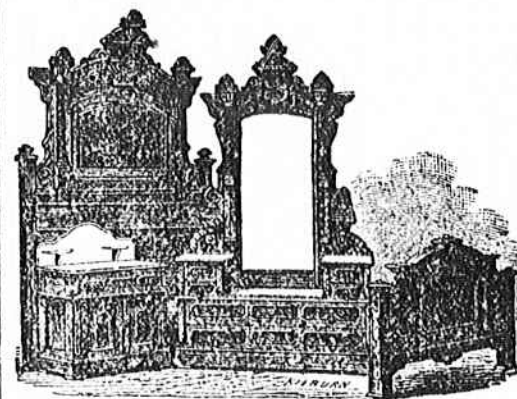
