State vs. August Vallmort, indicted for malicious mischief— Λ . M. Mackey for defendant. Vordict -Not guilty, under instruction of his Honor the presiding judge.

State vs. Frank Belton, indicted for malicious mischief-Jno. S. Reynolds for defendant. Verdict-Guilty. A motion for a new trial was made by the defendant's counsol, and, aftor argument, overruled by his Honor.


