THE CIRCUIT COURT.—The following is a synopsis of the business disposed of in the circuit court since our last report:

W. R. Doty vs. Samuel McCormick and Mary E. McCormick, action on sealed note—McCants & Douglass for plaintiff, Wm. H. Lyles for defendants. Verdict for plaintiff in the sum of \$261.10. Defendants' counsel gave notice of a motion for a new trial.

Wm. C. Harrison vs. G. Butler Pettigrew, action to recover possession of a horse—Gaillard & Reynolds for plaintiff, A. M. Mackey and A. S. Douglass for defendant. Motion, on the part of defendant, for a nonsuit made, argued and overruled. Verdict for defendant.

Thomas Lauderdale vs. Mitchell L. Owings, action to set aside certain leases mentioned in the complaint; Mitchell L. Owings vs. Thomas Lauderdale, action to enforce a contract alleged to have been made by defendant. These two cases were tried together, Jas. H. Rion representing Lauderdale, and A. M. Mackey appearing for Owings.

In the afternoon session on Monday, after the juries were excused for the day, the applicants for admission to the bar, Mr. P. H. Nelson, of Camden, and Mr. Ashbel G. Brice, of Fairfield, were examined in open court. Colonel Rion examined the applicants on contracts and real estate, Mr.

Reynolds on criminal law, pleading and practice, and Mr. Gaillard on the constitution of South Carolina and of the United States. Both applicants passed a creditable examination, and were duly sworn and admitted to practice in the circuit and probate courts of the State.
