DEATH OF AN OLD CITIZEN.—Mr. David Campbell, a well-known citizen of Fairfield, died on Tuesday morning. His remains were interred in the Presbyterian cemetery yesterday afternoon. Mr. Campbell was in the seventy-second year of his age and was held in high esteem by all who knew him.

TIME EXTENDED.—A telegram received yesterday morning from Comptroller-General Hagood states that he has extended for fifteen days the time in which taxes may be paid without the penalty. This will be good news to the taxpayers, all of whom are willing enough, but hardly able, at this particular time, to meet the demands made upon them.

Frankfort," a fictitious personage, will come up this morning in the Court of General Sessions for Richland county.

LINDSAY'S PATENT WASHER.—This is a contrivance recently invented by Jno. C. Lindsay, of North Carolina. It is said to be an excellent thing. The right for South Carolina has been purchased by Rev. J. STATE FAIR NOTES.—Brig. Gen. F. M. Bamberg, of Barnwell, will command the military parade at the State Fair. Governor Hampton will review the troops; and he requests that the members of his staff that can conveniently do so will attend him on the review.

Governor Vance, of North Carolina, will certainly accept the invitation to deliver an address at the Fair. His formal acceptance has not yet been received, but they say he is coming nevertheless.

THE BACK POLL TAX.—Some doubt has arisen as to the right of the State to assess and collect the poll taxes for past years—that is of any year other than for which the assessment is made. The question was first raised by Mr. C. H. Moise, auditor of Sumter county. After a full consideration of the matter, Attorney-General Connor decided against the assessment, and the comptroller-general has issued instructions to the county auditors accordingly.

The furniture ordered for Mount Zion School has arrived. It consists of a handsome Franklin school globe, but quadrant, a geared tellurian; a full set of large sized outline maps, eleven indestructible charts; containing diagrams illustrative of natural philosophy and kindred sciences; charts, penmanship and grammar; and a set of mathematical figures and bodies. The globe was presented by Mr. James B. McCants, and the other apparatus by the ladies of the Auxiliary Christian Association. The outfit is handsome and useful, and is great acquisition to the School.

APPLICATION REJECTED.—The following has been forwarded to us by Hon. Jno. H. Evins, M. C. It explains itself:

### POST OFFICE DEPARTMENT, APPOINTMENT OFFICE, October 25, 1877.

Sir—A proper regard to the economical and efficient administration of this Department forbids the multiplication of Post Offices within short distances of each other, or at points not directly on mail routes. In the former cases, it has been found that the revenues of the service are not generally increased, nor the public convenience promoted, as expected. In the other case, where the travel of the mail is increased, the expense almost invariably exceeds the proceeds of the new office.

The Postmaster General is therefore constrained to decide against the application for a Post Office at Flint Hill, in the County of Fairfield, and State of South Carolina, and the appointment of B. F. Boulware as Postmaster, because that place is not on any mail route now in operation.

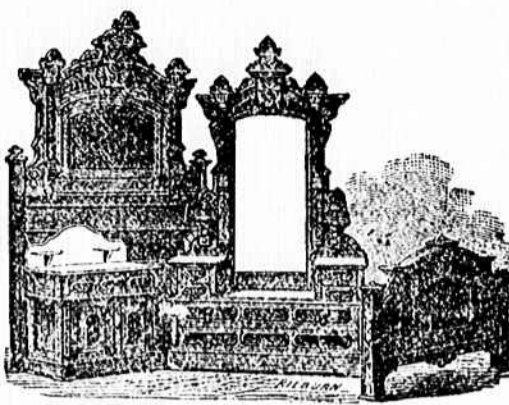
