**RAILWAY ACCIDENT.**—A report reached Winnsboro at a late hour last evening, that a trestle above Smith's Turnout, on the Charlotte, Columbia and Augusta Railroad, had given away as yesterday's northern passenger train was passing over it, and two cars were precipitated into the water. It was not known at that hour whether any passengers had been drowned.

Deputies have started through the county to collect forfeited taxes, and real estate will be sold on sales-day in December. While some tracts are advertised, doubtless through erroneous entries or neglect of persons transferring property to record the change, as required, in the auditor's office, it is true that a number of taxpayers have not been able to pay their taxes. This has arisen from sheer want of money, and we hope the State will be as lenient as possible.

**CAPTURE OF FRANK SALLY.**—This notorious burglar and sneak-thief was captured by Mr. Ralph D. Wilson last Tuesday night, at the house of George Goza, colored, near Ridgeway, where he had taken refuge until his buckshot wounds should heal. These wounds he received recently in a chase near Messrs. Morrison & Co.'s turpentine distillery, where he had committed some depredations. We understand there are half a dozen warrants out for him.

As has been announced, the ladies of Ridgeway gave a hot dinner and supper last Tuesday. This day was selected as most propitious, owing to the sale of the personal and real effects of David H. Ruff, deceased, and the large crowd of citizens whose presence was expected on that day. The weather was delightful—the Indian Summer's sun, and the almost harvest moon waited upon and illumined the day and the night, while the beautiful ladies decorated and made brighter still the hall, the flower-decked tables and the general surroundings. Two of the most delightful and sumptuous meals were served—a gentleman stating 'pon honor, that Delmonico could not surpass them in

variety and delicacy. The ladies are much gratified at their success—the receipts reaching near fifty dollars; and they beg to say that the flag of the Hampton Rifle Guard is assured.

**THE MAILS.**—When it was announced that by means of the quick schedule the Charleston papers would reach us on the day of publication, we were happy. When the Register announced that it would defy opposition, and deliver the morning paper in Winnsboro by 8, a. m., we were still happier. As matters now stand, however, we get the Charleston papers as before, a day old, while the Register has actually lost time, and reaches us at the same time as its competitors. Why is this thus? There are now two day trains from Columbia, instead of one. Mr. Brown figures it out thus: If the Register reached Winnsboro on the day of publication when one train was running, and comes a day late when two trains are running, it is likely, if another train were started, the Register wouldn't come before the end of the week. This equals Davy Crockett's story of fashionable life in Washington, where dinner was so late they had to eat supper the next morning. Something ought to be done in the matter. If not, we will have to organize an opposition telegraph line, and start a daily ourselves.

**Notes from Blackstock.**  
 BLACKSTOCK, Nov. 22.—A few days since a colored boy in the vicinity of Blackstock was killed by the falling of a tree. The boy's brother was cutting down the tree, and as it was falling, the deceased ran to get out of the way, but a limb struck him on the head, killing him instantly. Trial Justice Mackorell, acting coroner, summoned a jury of inquest, which found a verdict in accordance with the facts.

A wedding took place here a few nights ago. A couple stepped into Trial Justice Mackorell's office, and, to his great astonishment, announced that they wished to be married. Our trial justice was not well posted in that portion of his duties, but was equal to the emergency; so he scooped up an old "Confession of Faith," and read the ceremony from it, thereby uniting them in the bonds of wedlock with much honor to himself and pleasure to those present.

Our hotel is again vacant, Mr. Mackorell having removed to his old stand near the cross roads. It is expected that the hotel will shortly be reopened and refurbished by another party.
