SUICIDES NORTH AND SOUTH .- The United States census of 1870 develops some very curious facts on this subject. showing that the pretended hot-headed and impressionable Southern race is far behind its Northern brother in this particular. For instance, Alabama, with 996,000 inhabitants, had only 8 suicides, while Connecticut, the land of steady habits, with only 537,000, had 21; New Jersey, with 1060,000, had 51; Michigan, with less than 1,200,000 had four times the number of Alabama, and Massachusetts, the home of moral ideas and the nursery of publie schools, had 65, or thirteen times as many as Alabama; and again, South Carolina, with a population of 705,000. hud 5, and North Carolina, with over a million, had 10 suicides.
