Annual Meeting of the B. & L. Association.

The second annual meeting of the Lancaster County Building & Loan Association was held last week, and the old officers were re-elected, as follows:

President, R. E. Wylie. Vice-President, W. T. Gregory. Secretary & Treasurer, W. C. Thomson.

The Treasurer's statement shows that there are 353 shares with \$24 per share paid and having a book value of \$26.28 per share, which shows an average interest earning of about 9 1/2 per cent. per annum. They have loaned out \$8,647.
