Searles Follows Hevemeyer.

The proverb that it is the unexpected that happens was signally falsified yesterday when Judge Bradley ordered the acquittal of John E. Searles of the charge of contempt. It has been judically established now that Messrs. Havemeyer and Searles do not hold the Senate in contempt. These are the only two American citizens of whom this can be said.

The acquittal of Mr. Searles ought to spur the Senate to push the investigation which legal technicalities have temporarily blocked. Yesterdry Senator Smith, of New Jersey, took the floor on a question of personal privilege to of the South, repel Mr. Tillman's imputations as far as they concerned himself. and to assure the country that he had neither bought nor sold a share of Sugar stock during this session. This is excellent as far it goes, but what the public wants is not private denials but official action. It is the Senate, not any particular Senator, whose reputation has been besmirched, and it is the place of the Senate to resent the charges and disprove them if it can. Mr. Haveweyer and Mr. Searles evidently know a good many things that would throw light on the question of Senatorial guilt or innocence, and the country will not be satisfied care until they have been put through the investigating wringer and squeezed dry of information .-- N.
