A VERY BITTER PILL.

Given the Spottsmen By Mr. McKinley.

Washington, July 28.—President McKinley has promulgated the following important amendment to civil service rule 2:

"No removal shall be made from any position subject to competitive examination except for just cause and upon written charges filed with the head of the department or other appointing officer and of which the accused shall have full notice and an opportunity to make defense."

He also amended rule 3 so as to include within the classified service the employees of all custom house officers with no regard to number of employees. Hitherto the classification embraced customs offices where the number of employees was five or more. This order brings into the classified service 65 hitherto unclassified officers. The President has also amended rule 6, making exceptions to examinations, so as to read as follows:

Custom House Service—One cashier in each customs district, one chief or principal deputy or assistant collector in each customs district, one principal deputy collector at each sub-post or station.

Internal Revenue Service—One employe in each internal revenue district who shall act as cashier or chief deputy or assistant collector as may be determined by the treasury department; one deputy collector in each internal revenue district where the number of employes in the office of the collector exceeds four; one deputy collector in each stamp (or branch) office.

Appointments to the positions named in this rule in the custom house service and internal revenue service shall be subject to an examination to be prescribed by the secretary of the treasury not disapproved by the commission, equal to the examination held by the commission for positions of like grade. Such examinations shall be conducted by the commission in accordance with its regulations.

The plan of the extension which was formulated by Secretary Gage and Assistant Secretary Vanderlip has the unqualified and hearty endorsement of the civil service commission, who earnestly recommend to the President its approval. In speaking of the amendment, President Proctor of the commission said that friends of the civil service reform everywhere congratulate themselves on this most marked advance of the cause. The commission in its last annual report had said that government officers should have the power of removal for the proper reasons.

TILLMAN AT TIRZAH

He Will Make a Big Speech to Alliancemen.

Senator Ben Tillman is about to begin the series of speeches he expects to make in this State within the next month or more. He has already announced that one of the main objects of his speeches will be to defend the dispensary system before the people. Inasmuch as the dispensary is being so vigorously attacked in various quarters by former friends and the United States courts are making it a little more difficult for it to run, Senator Tillman's speeches will be looked forward to with some curiosity at least.

Today Senator Tillman is to speak in Mooresville, N. C. by special invitation.

Senator Tillman's principal speech will be delivered at Tirzah on Friday of next week on the occasion of the annual encampment of the aliancemen. This encampment is a big thing, being attended by hundreds of aliancemen from all parts of the upper section of the State. It was stated yesterday that Senator Tillman intended to "spread himself" on this occasion, and yesterday the politicians and aliancemen were discussing the coming speech not a little.

Arrangements have been completed also for his appearance in Abbeville on Wednesday of next week. He is to speak in Abbeville by invitation of the county alliance and in connection with the county farmer's institute. The speech will be delivered at the county court house. Senator Tillman has formally accepted the invitation, but the subject of his speech is not known.
