## WHOLESONE ADVICE.

### COLORED PREACHERS CALL ON THE GOVERNOR.

Against Lawlessness in the Shape of Lynching—They are Advised to Preach Against the cause, Which They Say They Have and Will continue to Do.

Among the callers on Governor Ellerbe yesterday was the following delegation of colored ministers of the Florence District Conference, which at its meeting at Timmonsville, July, 29, passed resolutions condemnatory of lynching and appointed a committee to present the paper to the governor. The committee consisted of A. G. Townsoud, P. E.; N. T. Spencer, C. R. Brown, Silas Easterling, E. B. Boroughs, E. J. Sawyer.

Their memorial follows.

Your committee on lynching and general lawlessness beg leave to report that they view with serious apprehension the growing disregard of law and order which is so painfully manifest throughout the length and breadth of our country.

In the north, east, south and west the orderly investigation and punishment of crimes by our time honored courts are too often displaced by heated, excited and prejudiced judgement, and the cruel and inhuman taking of life by lawless and Godless mobs.

Your committee wish to submit that they are surprised at the failure on the part of the past administration to bring to justice the perpetrators of these crimes of infamy upon a poor and helpless people. We are also surprised at the repeated announcements made to the public through the press that the "best people" engage in these lynchings.

This condition of affairs is fast becoming alarming in the south; unless something is done, and done speedily, to re-establish the majesty of the law, decrease crime and stop lynchings, an era of bloodshed, carnage and devastation such as never has been witnessed under the stars and stripes of the American republic will be precipitated upon us.

We therefore recommend:

1. That the preachers of this district conference be required,

and all other colored preachers in the state be requested, to condemn from their pulpits any and every violation of law, whether it be insulting a white child or lynching a negro. That they be urged to teach by both precept and example a high moral standard and obedience to law.

2. That we extend to his Excellency Governor Ellerbe our grateful thanks for the efforts that he has made and has promised to make to prevent lynching and punish lynchers and other law breakers in South Carolina, as the laws of our state direct they shall be. That we assure him, and through him the white citizen of the state and nation, that we have no sympathy for those of our race who commit nameless crimes upon the fair sex, and will do all in our power to assist in bringing such to just punishment. But we insist that they should be tried and convicted by due process of law and not made scapegoats for the crimes of other races, as is too often done, when mobs are allowed to convict and punish without even a form of trial.

3. That we appeal to the white pulpit of the state to assist us in creating a strong public sentiment against all forms of lawlessness, especially that of mob violence, which is becoming so common and threatening in our otherwise peaceful, prosperous and beautiful country. That we appreciate the strong and manly fight made by the press of the state against mob law, believing as we do, that more can be accomplished through the efforts of the press and the pulpit along this line than by any other means.

4. That a committee be appointed by this conference to present a copy of this report to the governor; with such additional explanation of our position on the subject matter of this paper, as they may think proper; and that the same committee be charged with the duty of publishing the said report.

Governor Ellerbe received them courteously, and in reply informed them as chief executive it would always be his effort to see that the law was upheld and that lynching would be prevented as far as it lay in his power. At the same time he pointed out to the preachers that one of the best methods to prevent lynchings was for them to preach against the crime which leads to mob law and inculcate a wholesome fear of the retribution which was sure to follow, as well as the moral enormity of such a crime. They replied that they had already and would continue to do so.—Register.

### Wannamaker on Advertising.

"I never in my life used such a thing as a poster, or dodger, or handbill. My plan for 20 years has been to buy so much space in a newspaper and fill it up as I wanted. I would not give an advertisement in a newspaper of 500 circulation for 5,000 dodgers or posters. If I wanted to sell cheap jewelry or run a gambling scheme I might use posters; but

I would not insult a decent reading public with handbills. The class of people who read them are too poor to look to for support in the mercantile affairs. I deal directly with the publishers. I say to him: 'How long will you let me run a column of matter through your paper for \$100 or \$500,' as the case may be. I let him do the figuring, and if I think he is not trying to take more than his share I give him the copy. I lay aside the profits on a particular line of goods for advertising purposes. At first I laid aside \$3,000; last year I laid aside and spent \$40,000. I have done better this year and shall increase that sum as the profits warrant it. I owe my success to newspapers, and to them I freely give a certain profit of my yearly business."

### Good Work for Convicts.

Highways are the arteries through which the commerce of the country circulates. Therefore, every citizen, regardless of his business and irrespective of his abode, is interested in good roads.

It would be difficult if not impossible, for the importance of this subject to be overestimated. The comparatively new statute authorizing the employment of short-term convicts on the public roads in the various counties is one that commends itself to the judgment of our wisest and most thoughtful men, and must inevitably result in beneficial effects to the public weal. Evidence of its happy effects are present in every county in the state.
