FACE TO FACE WITH DEATH.

Arctic Explorer Greely Tells of His Rescue by Captain Schley.

General Greely, in the October Ladies' Home Journal, tells, for the first time, the details of his awful winter at Cape Sabine. Eighteen of his party of twenty-four Arctic explorers had perished from cold and starvation when Captain (now Admiral) Schley, heading a relief party, rescued the survivors just in the nick of time. "Summer crept slowly on, but food came grudgingly," writes General Greely. "Each worked to the end, and even on the very morn none ever knew that Death would that day touch him. One after another passed, and when a mighty midsummer gale from the south broke our hitherto uninterrupted scientific observations, there was left seven wan spectres. There was not the physical strength to raise the wind-struck tent, and the end was in sight. Was it to be life or death? It was foolish to hope, for even now did not the midnight-sun, that marked midsummer, from that very day (June 21) leave us with coming winter in utter darkness? Had we seven, who were left, gone through all those two hundred and seventy-eight days of suffering amid those icy scenes for naught? But for all that there was a strong faith that this gale must favor the American ships that must be working northward through the ice. And this faith in country turned to reality forty hours later, when our nation's sailers vied in tender offices and sympathy for their comrades of the Army thus saved from death."

- Crops on a drained soil have a longer season for maturity.
- A well underdrained soil will increase the crop production from 10 to 50 per cent, sometimes more.
- A drained soil is in the best possible condition to grow maximum crops with intelligent husbandry.—Drainage Journal.

Saved His Life.

It is not general known, we believe, that Miss Winnie Davis once played an unconscious, but effective part in saving her father from assassination. The circumstances, briefly narrated, are that when Mr. Davis was on his way to Fortress Monroe, as a prisoner, a party of officers on one of the Federal war vessels anchored in Hampton Roads, determined to kill him if opportunity presented. It was presented when he appeared on deck of the vessel which conveyed him to the fort, and within pistol range of the conspirators who at once drew lots to decide who should shoot him. The officer who drew the fatal token took a position convenient with army rifles, aimed at his intended victim, and was on the point of firing, when Miss Winnie, who was then a little child, moved to her father's side, and stood so as to cover his body until the opportunity passed. But for accidental presence at the critical moment he would have been killed. There is no question as to the truth of the story. It was told in detail in the Boston Journal two or three years ago, by the chaplain of the Brooklyn Navy yard, who was himself the officer who drew the lot.—News and Courier.

Lieut. Hobson has Saved the Spanish Flagship.

Playa del Este, Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, Sept. 25.—The wrecking company engaged under Lieut. Hobson in the work of saving the wrecked Spanish warship has succeeded in floating the cruiser Infanta Maria Teresa. The cruiser after being got afloat was taken in tow by the Potomac, and conveyed by the cruiser Newark, the Scorpion and Alvarado, proceeded for Guantanamo bay, where she arrived last night. The successful issue of the attempt was greeted by the blowing of whistles, firing of national salutes and by cheers, in which the Cubans joined, disturbing the noon siesta.

The Newark, under Capt. Goodrich, rendered valuable assistance in the work of saving the Maria Teresa. The cruiser is being put in condition for her trip north by the repair ship Vulcan.

In his speech at Knoxville Gen. Alger said: "Had the war department been acquainted with the conditions said to have existed at Chickamauga, the troops there would have been moved long before they were. We received only good reports at Washington from the commanding officers, and it was supposed that the outside reports were exaggerated. The commanders of camps are responsible for the condition of their camps, and if the men are not well cared for and if the hospital and sanitary conditions are bad, the commanding officer must answer for it."

Mr. Andrew Johnson, one of Lancaster's oldest and most successful citizens, quietly passed away Sunday afternoon at 5:30 o'clock after a lingering illness of several weeks. He was born in Lancaster county where he lived all his life, some 75 or 80 years. On March 17th, 1840, he was married to Miss Hannah Jane Horton who survived her husband, and to them were born 10 children, only three of whom are now living, two of the sons having been killed in the war between the States. The surviving children are: Messrs. M. H. and H. M. Johnson and Mrs. W. T. Gregory, all of whom are well and favorably known to our readers.

Mr. Johnson was a man of sterling worth, an excellent, upright citizen, a kind husband and an indulgent father.

He was a member of the Lancaster Baptist church and when his health would permit was a regular attendant upon its services.

He leaves a very nice estate, including \$2,000 life insurance.

His remains were interred Monday afternoon at six o'clock in the new cemetery, after a funeral service at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. W. T. Gregory, conducted by his pastor, Rev. J. H. Boldridge.
