LANCASTER A MILL TOWN.

The Cotton Factory has Done so Well that It is to Be Enlarged To a Million Dollar Mill—A Big Electric Plant to be Erected at Landsford on the Catawba—Crops, Politics and Other Matters.

The cotton mill at this place, now operating about four hundred and seventy-five looms, is now and has been doing a good work, making good profits.

The work of enlarging the same to the capacity of a million dollar mill is now about to commence. Brick making has already begun.

The contract for four million bricks has been let to a Mr. Tanner, of Charlotte, the contract to be completed on or before the 1st day of December. Two or more machines for making the brick will be in full operation in a few days, and a large force of hands are now being employed in the work. The construction of the enlarged plant will be pushed forward with great rapidity. The present mill will be continued in operation, without hindrance, during the work on the increase mill plant, which will be located on the same ground, separated from the present building only by a street running between. The new mill will be operated by electricity, generated at Landsford, on the Catawba River, about eight miles distant.

The plant for generating the electricity and the water dam will be constructed at once at Landsford, on the Catawba, by another company, which is already at work.

The money has already been secured, and Lancaster will soon become one of the leading factory towns in this part of the state. Col. Leroy Springs is a hustler, with the capital at his back. He is leading in this great enterprise, and his untiring energy and conspicuous personality, will be manifest in the

growing prosperity of this historic county.

This electric enterprise now being started at Landsford is a big thing. It is designed to furnish electricity to run the mill in Lancaster, Rock Hill and Chester. The electric plant on the Catawba, higher up, opposite Rock Hill, now in construction, we are informed, is designed for the mills in Charlotte.

St. Louis, July 23.—Captain Robley D. Evans, of the United States Navy, passing through the city enroute to Washington, talked freely of the Chinese situation.
