UNION SWEEP BY A TORNADO.

Six Killed; Many Injured and Dwellings and Stores Torn into Kindling Wood.

Union, May 25.—Three dead and seven seriously wounded, with one dwelling house a total wreck, one other badly damaged, and a school house destroyed tells the story of a storm which struck the south end of this city at 4:30 today.

THE DEAD.

Miss Sallie Hart.

Those hurt, of which three may die, are:
Lee Sims, cut in head.

Mackswell Sims, husband of the dead woman and father of the dying baby, had his left arm broken at the wrist.

Mrs. Vernon Mabry, badly cut but not seriously injured.

Vernon Mabry, her husband, badly burned on shoulder and one leg broken.

Also infant baby badly and very probably fatally injured.

The dwelling totally destroyed was that in which all three were killed, and was occupied by the two Sims families and probably the Mabry family.

Miss Sallie Hart and sister had gone to the Sims house for protection, probably living in a house by themselves. One sister was killed and the other received no injury.

Miss Annie Lawson of Jonesville was probably over there on a visit, though no one knew.

The school house was valued at about \$1,000, and the school was taught by Miss Thespa Sartar and Miss Bessie Young.

The house in which Mr. Anderson and Frank Turner lived, situated next to the Sims house, was badly damaged, with all the household goods.

LYNCHING TOO GOOD FOR HIM.

Millard Lee Shoots and Kills Miss Suttle in Church, Because She Refused his Attentions.

Atlanta, Ga., May 25.—Five or six hundred men, divided into half dozen posses, are tonight searching the country adjacent to this city for Millard Lee, the son of a well known farmer who today shot and instantly killed Miss Lilla Suttle, a young woman of 19. The tragedy took place at Wesley chapel, Mount Gilead camp grounds, nine miles from Atlanta, Lee firing two bullets in to Miss Suttle just as the benediction and before any of the worshippers had started to leave the church.

Lee, who is about 20 years of age, came into the church during the services and took a seat two pews from the door and almost directly behind Miss Suttle. Just as the services were over and the congregation had risen to its feet, Lee leaned forward and fired two shots at Miss Suttle killing her instantly. Lee escaped, and meeting his father some distance from the church secured \$100 from him. Several posses were soon organized and a call sent in for bloodhounds. Dr. John Suttle, father of the murdered girl, heads one of the posses while his son directs another.

Miss Suttle was a strikingly beautiful young woman and had recently graduated with high honors from a college. It is said that she refused Lee's attentions because she considered herself above him socially.
