### Chester Negro Gets a Legal Trial For Rape.

Chester, July 7.—Court convened here today, Judge Buchanan presiding. The session lasted one day and only one case was tried. A few weeks ago, it will be remembered, a case of attempted rape was reported from the Edgemoor section of this county. Green Blake, colored, attempted the crime upon the daughter of Mr. Clinton, a highly respected farmer. The little girl had not reached her teens.

The fiend did not accomplish his purpose, being interrupted he was trailed and caught and lodged in the Chester jail and has remained there ever since. He has no lawyer to defend him and conducted his own case. He made a short speech, addressing the judge, solicitor, jury and lawyers and remarked that all knew he was innocent from the very fact that he was alive in the court house today.

He finished his speech, the jury was out only a few minutes bringing in a verdict of guilty.

Blake was sentenced by Judge Buchanan to 10 years in the penitentiary.

### King's Condition Improved.

London, July 6.—King Edward's progress tonight continues to be good. It is stated that if the improvement proceeds at the present rate he will probably, by the end of the month, be well enough to be transferred to the royal yacht in the Southampton waters. A bulletin posted at 9 o'clock this morning said: "The king's progress continues in every way satisfactory."

Soon after the bulletin was issued Queen Alexandra and Princess Victoria visited Marlborough House, where they attended divine service with the Prince and Princess of Wales. The Queen stayed within Buckingham Palace for the rest of the day.

Most of the churches in the United Kingdom celebrated today the announcement that King Edward was out of danger with informal thanksgiving services, special music and the singing of the national anthem.

The government has issued orders that the Indian and Colonial troops now in London shall postpone their departure indefinitely. These orders are due to the strongly expressed desire of the Indian troops especially to see the king before they return home, and they also indicate an intention to retain the troops here until the coronation. The Colonial and Indian troops will participate in the reception to be given to Lord Kitchener when he arrives in England about July 12.

The lord mayor of London, Sir Joseph C. Dimsdale, received a letter tonight from Sir Francis Knollis, private secretary to the king, to the effect that his majesty had commanded him to convey to all concerned his gratification at and warm thanks for the energy and foresight which made the king's dinner to the poor on Saturday such a great success, and to repeat how sincerely his majesty regretted his inability to be present and how touched he was by the loyal and kindly feelings so universally displayed.

—Yorkville has let the contract for the building of a \$12,500 graded school building. Messrs. Kellar & Co., of Yorkville, have the contract.

—Report of a very heavy rainfall comes from several points in western New York. At one place the rainfall last Saturday was reported to be 3.86 inches.

—Major Micah Jenkins has been appointed to succeed Geo. R. Koester as collector of internal revenue for South Carolina. Koester's nomination several months ago failed of confirmation by the Senate.

—President Roosevelt has again appointed W. L. Harris postmaster for Charleston.

—Rev. T. W. Sloan has resigned his pastoral of A. R. P. church of Abbeville to accept that of the Greenville church.

—Mr. Alex Baker and his mother, Mrs. Molsie Baker, the former 47 and the latter about 62 years of age, both died of typhoid fever at their home near Lynch's river Sunday night. Mrs. Baker died at 9 o'clock and her son about 2½ hours later.

They were living alone. Both led exemplary lives and were honored and respected by all in their community. They were buried yesterday afternoon at Flat Creek church, after funeral services by Rev. T. A. Dabney of Rock Hill, their former pastor.—Era.

—The handsome residence of Mr. T. J. Martin of Chester was totally destroyed by fire Monday.

—Nine thousand freight handlers of Chicago are out on a strike for higher wages.

—The strike of the anthracite coal miners is in its ninth week with no prospect of a settlement.
