## PRESIDENT HARTZOG AND CLEMSON COLLEGE.

A Tribute to His Efforts to Build Up This Institution—Splendid Field for Him.

Clemson College, July 26.—As announced in The State, Dr. Henry S. Hartzog yesterday sent his resignation of the presidency of Clemson college to Col. R. W. Simpson, chairman of the board of trustees. Dr. Hartzog has accepted the presidency of the University of Arkansas. Before doing so, however, he went to Fayetteville to investigate conditions there.

The University of Arkansas is a large growing institution, with fine equipment and over a thousand students. The faculty numbers about seventy.

Dr. Hartzog says that he could not in justice to himself refuse the offer of so great a promotion, both as to salary and opportunities.

The university has selected a wise head. Dr. Hartzog is a man of acknowledged ability and indomitable energy. In the big western country he will find ample opportunity for the exercise of his talents. Those who know him feel confident of his success. As an extremely young man he faced and solved many hard problems at a critical period in Clemson's history, and much of her prosperity today is due to his ability and push.

In about five years the number of students has increased from 330 to 500. The first textile school of the south was established and is in successful operation; the new dormitory has been erected; the chemical laboratory doubled; the electrical laboratories more than doubled; a handsome veterinary building constructed, and many improvements made. Of course, Clemson's wide awake trustees have been the mainstay of Clemson from its beginning, and all this progress is due to them as well. We mention these things to show how harmoniously trustees, president and faculty have moved together. The fact that the trustees refused to accept Dr. Hartzog's resignation last June is sufficient evidence of the esteem in which they held him.

Dr. Hartzog will leave some time in August for his new field of duty. He carries with him the very best wishes of all for the success he merits.

## SEABOARD BUYS UPPER END OF THREE C's.

And Will Have a Short Line From the Ocean to the Great Lakes.

Baltimore, July 26.—It is announced here that the Seaboard Air Line Railroad company has bought the South and Western railway. The latter is a new company under which two or more roads will be consolidated. It owns the Ohio River and Charleston railroad, which it is proposed to extend from the coal fields of southwest Virginia to Lincolnton, N. C., where, according to plans, connection is to be made with the Seaboard Air Line. The scheme for this development was financed by the Union Trust company of this city.

The promoters of the scheme announce that the route planned will be the shortest line from the Virginia coal fields to Atlantic coast and the south.

The proposed road will be about 275 miles in length, but it is thought that the mileage will be increased by its extension in a northerly direction. Connection may be made with Detroit Southern at Ironton, O. The Detroit Southern operates from Detroit to Wellston, O., give Lima, 343 miles, with branches 80 miles, a total of 423 miles.

### THE OLD 3 C'S.

Knoxville, Tenn., July 26.—The Ohio River and Charleston road extends from Johnson City, Tenn., to Hurdale, N. C., a distance of 34 miles. It was originally the Tennessee section of the Charleston, Cincinnati and Chicago project. The Carolina portion of this road was built from Camden, S. C., to Marion, N. C., 171 miles, and is now known as the South Carolina and Georgia Extension and is controlled by the Southern railway. The Ohio River and Charleston was recently sold by Samuel Hunt & Co. to the South and Western, of which George L. Carter of Bristol, Tenn., who organized the Virginia Iron, Coal and Coke Company and the Virginia and Southwestern Railway is president.
