### ALL RECORDS BROKEN

And the Situation is Still Serious at Points.

Memphis, Tenn., March 15.—The flood situation between Caruthersville, Mo., and Baton Rouge, La., is serious tonight. The river is rising rapidly and it will be a little short of marvelous if the levees hold the great volume of rushing water. The gauge at Memphis tonight marks 38.5 feet, a rise of one and two tenths feet since last night. This is the highest water ever recorded here and Local Observer Emory of the weather bureau said tonight that 39½ feet would be registered by Tuesday, and those interested have been warned to prepare for a stage of 40 feet. The situation in and around Memphis is becoming more serious. Without a single exception the numerous lumber plants in north Memphis have suspended operations owing to the encroachment of the waters. At Fourth and Market streets people are moving about in shifts and the street railway has annulled all schedules in this part of the city. Three of the Illinois Central tracks are under water north of Auction street, although traffic has not been suspended on them, but if the water continues to rise trouble is expected there. At Ensley, six miles below Memphis, 500 feet of the Yazoo and Mississippi Valley tracks are inundated, but they were cribbed over today and trains are running through.

The Choctaw railroad has suspended operations between Hopefield and Wolfe river and all trains are being sent over the Memphis bridge.

A dangerous place in the levee is reported from Hollybush, 20 miles north of here. Engineers of St. Francis board with a steamboat went to the scene this afternoon. It was found that the water was running over the levee for a distance of 600 feet. Men and material are being sent there and a strong fight is being made to hold the embankment, but it is believed by many that a breach will occur in a day or two. Refugees with hundreds of horses and mules continue to arrive here every hour.

Thousands of people lined the river banks today watching the swift moving current and several excursion steamers carried many more up and down the river, so a good view of the vast expanse of water could be had.

New Orleans, March 15.—The gauge here tonight reads a little over 19.3, which is only two tenths below the record of 1897, but the sudden change from stormy weather to sunshine and brightness has given renewed hope all along the line. Saturday's terrific rain was a test in itself and not a sign of weakness was displayed. With good weather more workers have been enlisted and more work rushed, and even those who were ready to surrender weak places to the river's rush have gained courage and say any volume of water can be met. A week ago it was thought there would surely be a crevasse at Arlington, a short distance below Baton Rouge. There had been a cave in the old levee and a long new levee was start-



ed in the rear. This was in process of construction when a high water came. The new levee was then abandoned and a smaller new levee was built around the cave proper. During the terrific rains it was feared the work could not be completed, but several thousand workers and other laborers were kept busy, the river was held back and the task finished when the storm was at its height Saturday. Governor Heard made an inspection yesterday during the rain and went there again today and is satisfied the danger is past.

In the city there is great rejoicing because even with the record rain of eight inches on Saturday no water from the river came over, and the entire line, reinforced by rows of earth filled sacks, is proving its efficiency. With good weather the river's defense will be solidified and reinforced so that even the highest water on record will be handled in safety.

Vicksburg, Miss., March 15.—The river gauge here this evening registers 48.7, a two-tenths rise since morning. Today has been the first clear, sunny day in two weeks and with a cessation of the rains there is a corresponding increase in the spirits of the dwellers behind the levees. Late reports state that all the embankments are holding on to the river in this district. The sawmill district, in the mouth of Wolf-creek on the left bank is threatened by backwater and a complete shut down of all the plants will probably result. Refugees from the lowland, with cattle and household goods, continue to arrive in every boat of 100 ft. length, and are being accommodated.

### AN ORDINANCE

To Prohibit Gambling in the Town of Lancaster, and Providing a Punishment Therefor.

Be it ordained by the Town Council of Lancaster, in Council assembled, and by the authority of the same:

Section 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to make any bet or wager of anything of value, upon the result of any game or games of any kind or character whatsoever, such as cards, dice, backgammon, draughts, bowls, billiards, pool, chess, etc., etc., played anywhere within the corporate limits of the Town of Lancaster.

Sec. 2. That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to permit, or allow, any person or persons to make any bet or wager of money or any other thing of value upon the result of any game or games played in any building, house, store or outhouse, either owned by or in his, her or their possession.

Sec. 3. That it shall be the duty of the Chief of Police and the other policemen of the Town, and they are hereby authorized and instructed, to enter any closed door or room for the purpose of arresting any person or persons violating any of the provisions of this ordinance.

Sec. 4. That any violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance on any day of the week, except Sunday, shall be punished by a fine of not less than Ten Dollars, nor more than Fifty Dollars, or by imprisonment for not less than ten days or more than thirty days.

Sec. 5. That any violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance, on Sunday, shall be punished by a fine of not less than Twenty Dollars, nor more

than One Hundred Dollars, or by imprisonment for not less than twenty nor more than thirty days.

Sec. 6. That all ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Ratified by Council in meeting assembled this 9th day of February, A. D. 1903.

### Meeting of Township Assessors.

The Township Board of Assessors for the various townships in the county of Lancaster will meet on the first Tuesday in March, 3rd instant, 1903.

It is the duty of Township Assessors to canvass each and every return of personal property of their respective townships, in order that individual returns may be equalized as near as possible.

In every instance where a material change in the return of any individual amounting to one hundred dollars and over, the Assessors will keep a note of the changes made and forward same by mail to the County Auditor so that notice can be sent to the parties so raised in order that the taxpayer may have the opportunity to appear before the County Board of Equalization.

The Township Assessors appointed by the Governor will take notice and qualify at once.

The Chairmen of Township Assessors are ex-officio members of the County Board of Equalization.
