THE KENTUCKY ASSASSINS CAUSE APPREHENSION

Jackson, Ky., June 20.—Since the removal of Jett and White to Lexington and the prospect of another trial in another county beyond the scene of the feud influence, there is considerable talk here of prosecution for perjury and bribery. It is said that a move is on foot to swear out warrants at once for the arrest of men in high places for bribery, perjury and accessory to the crime before the fact.

The situation is still one of apprehension. The foreman of the grand jury that indicted Jett and White has been threatened and soldiers were stationed around his house last night as well as around that of Haddix, who testified to seeing Crawford and Tharps, teamsters for Hargis Bros., coming from the Ewen hotel just before the fire was discovered. Anxiety is felt for other witnesses and jurors, and the provost marshal will continue holding Jackson under martial law.

SOMEWHAT SINGULAR

It seems a little singular that when a colored female postmaster in the south is disturbed in her work the whole power of the post-office department is instantly enlisted in her behalf, and yet a gang of thieves can loot the building where the postmaster general sits and he does not hear of it. A single negro man carried on a rural delivery route in Alabama has stones thrown at him, and forthwith the postmaster general reads the riot act to every southern constituency; yet when a reputable citizen of Washington makes affidavit that the department officials are in "caboot" with a business house to swindle the government, Mr. Payne refused to believe and took no steps to put a stop to it.

The Northwestern believes the republican frauds are not a whit better than those of democratic origin, and that a republican thief deserves punishment just as much as a democratic thief. There is ample reason to believe that there is rotteness in the postoffice department and that it is the duty of the postmaster general and the president to stop the frauds and punish the delinquents.—Commoner.

CROPS UTTERLY DESTROYED

By Fierce Rain and Windstorm in Bamberg County.

Govan, S. C., June 20.—The flood gates of the heavens over this community were let loose yesterday evening, and the water came down in torrents for three long hours. The lightning flashed, the thunder rolled and the wind howled in wild fury. This morning we "looked around on every side, and hope gave way before the scenes of desolation." The farmers say the crops are completely wrecked. Some of the fields of corn and cotton that were so lovely and promising only yesterday are now transformed into ponds, in which the frogs are happily croaking their weird and weary songs.

Some of the older folks say they have never before seen such a downpour of rain.

Fortunately the houses stood the wind and there was no loss of life except to poultry and hogs.

CONTRACT AWARDED.

Spartanburg, June 20.—The contract for tearing down and removing the debris at Clifton mills Nos. 1 and 2, and for the erection of two large factories at these two places has been let to the big contracting firm of Thompson & Co., of Birmingham, Ala. This firm built the Olympia mill in Columbia and the Buffalo mill near Union. It is stated that the rebuilding of the two Clifton mills will cost something like \$180,000. Thompson & Co. will have a large wrecking and clearing force on the scenes next week. The rebuilding of these plants means that the 43,024 spindles and 1,440 looms, the sum total of these two factories' equipment, which was silenced by the recent flood, will in the near future again be humming a merry sound of industry along the banks of the treacherous Pacolet.
